

News Summary.

The N. S. Local Government has adopted a resolution in favor of repealing the act of union between itself and the Dominion.

The alleged establishment of an organization to be known as "Protestant Electoral Association," each member of which must bind himself to vote for no candidate for civil, Provincial or Dominion honors who is not a Protestant, has caused considerable comment in Ottawa.

In the N. S. Legislature the Hon. Mr. Fielding brought down the Railway measure in the House this afternoon, his speech taking two hours in the delivery. Its main points are:

The whole Provincial railway system to be taken over by an English Syndicate, with a capital of five millions.

The Syndicate to build the line from Digby to Annapolis, its estimated cost \$200,000, also to get transfer of Windsor branch, and to give them a through line from Halifax to Yarmouth.

The Syndicate is composed of English and Nova Scotia capitalists. The latter are L. E. Baker, Jacob Bingsy, H. H. Fuller, John S. McLean, Adam Burns and William Ross.

The Province guarantees the interest not exceeding \$200,000 per annum for twenty years.

The Syndicate is to deposit \$1,250,000 with the Dominion Government at 4 per cent. as security for the above Provincial guarantee, \$25,000 has already been deposited as a forfeit.

Yarmouth Township is to have \$100,000 stock in the new Syndicate for its interest in the Western Counties, and Yarmouth stockholders also get \$100,000 of the new Syndicate stock for their old stock, and Yarmouth bondholders get \$100,000 cash for their bonds.

The bonds are to be floated in England. The Government retain control over the whole scheme.

Government also offer \$3,200 per mile (not to exceed \$250,000), and 2,600 acres of Crown lands per mile in addition.

Subsidies to aid extension of road to Cape Breton.

The Syndicate takes power to lease or take over the Nictaux and Atlantic road, and also to extend the road from Truro to Windsor.

The sixteenth annual report of the Ontario Mutual Life Co. is to hand and shows a state of affairs very gratifying to the policy-holders, who in this case constitute the company and own and control its entire assets.

With characteristic promptness the death claims, amounting to over \$28,000 were paid, and over \$25,000 given back to the policy-holders in the shape of profits.

The working expenses were reduced by \$6,500, while the interest income is about that amount in excess of that for the previous year, and the assets have increased from \$653,662 in 1894 to \$752,561 for 1895.
