ANOTHER LINK WITH VICTORIAN ERA HAS GONE WITH THIS MAN'S DEATH
 Sir Theodore Martin, Distinguished Humorist, Biographer and Historian, is Dead.
 "Tell the truth as you find it in the marriage at your command," she said. "Tell the truth, no matter what it hurts. Truth is a very precious thing to people in my position."
 Among Sir Theodore's many tributes, the most striking was that of Queen Victoria. "It is always to be remembered," he said, "that Queen Victoria was two women at the same time—on the one hand a loving wife and mother, and on the other an exalted and dignified Sovereign. In talking to the one woman you were never allowed to forget the other."
 The friendship between him and the Prince Consort's biography did not cease on the completion of the work. Sir Theodore continued to adore the Queen in literary matters, and has told many humorous stories of how he was asked to turn some of Mr. Gladstone's dispatches into intelligible English. Very often the first thing he would do when he went to Windsor, when he would find himself a fellow guest with either Mr. Gladstone or Disraeli. It gave him an opportunity of comparing the two statesmen. With the Queen Disraeli was by far the greater favorite. "Disraeli," Sir Theodore said, "had the art of appealing to a woman. Gladstone was too full of his own ideas."
