ENQUIRY INTO WORKING OF CITY ENGINEER'S OFFICE

Civic Sub Committee Met Last Evening to Consider If Office System Can Be Changed to Produce Better Results—Enquiry Under Oath Suggested.

Y. M. C. A. Expect to Have the Famous "Commoner" Here in September to Deliver a Lecture.

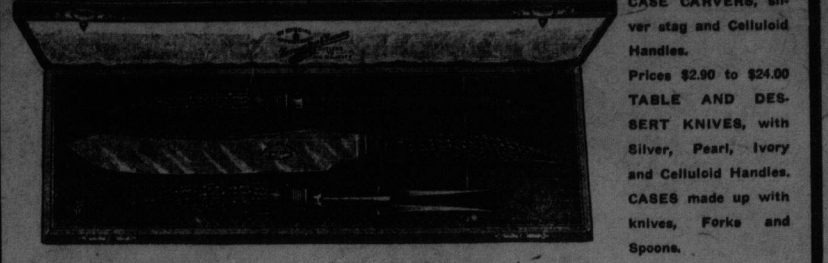
