MONTGOMERY WILL HAVE MOTOR FIRE ENGINE—GRAND LODGE OPENS

Nine Thousand Dollars for Modern Fire-Fighting Apparatus in Railway Town—Good Templars Meet.

Montreal, June 8.—The fire committee of the city council tonight decided to purchase a nine thousand dollar motor fire engine and other apparatus. The first business session will be held tomorrow. Great interest is attached to the session by reason of the presence of a number of members here to attend the meeting of the National Grand Lodge which opens on Thursday. These include O. P. Cambouris, National Counselor, of Winnipeg.

Strawberries Arriving.

The shipments of strawberries yesterday was the largest of the season. The Champlain, on the Bellevue route, had 70 crates of 24 boxes each of 4000 quarts in all. The D. J. Purdy, on the Washademoak route, landed 184 crates of 24 boxes each, or 10,416 quarts. The May Queen, on the Grand Lake and Gagetown route, landed 244 crates of 24 boxes each, or 15,120 quarts, making a total shipment of 27,902 quarts. The berries arrived in good order and showed a great improvement in the packing. With one or two exceptions they were in full quart boxes. Universal satisfaction is expressed as to the quality of proper inspection, and the fruit inspector is receiving many congratulations.

Perth, July 8.—Joseph Faulding, a respected citizen of this place, was found dead this morning about seven o'clock by John Howlett, in the latter's barn, about 5 miles from here. The deceased who was about 65 years old, had been accustomed since the coming of the hot weather to sleep in the barn. He was not at a school meeting this morning, and as he has always been remarkable for his punctuality, his non-appearance when the hour for the meeting arrived, caused some wonder and he was sought at his home. It was learned that he was not at home, and was found later in the barn. It is presumed that he went to the loft and fell through, sustaining a fatal injury. He is survived by three children, Percy, one of the most popular guides on the Tobacco; Mrs. Howard MacLachlan, both of Perth and Miss Nellie, of Kilbarn.

ITALY'S RESOURCES AMPLE, SHE SEEKS NO HELP ABROAD

Expert in Finance Says Rumors of Gold Imports are Unfounded—Gives Advice to American Bankers.
