FORD WILL WORK FOR PEACE CONFERENCE OF NEUTRAL NATIONS

Detroit, Nov. 19.—Henry Ford, automobile manufacturer, announced today that he will go to Washington soon and endeavor to discuss with President Wilson the plan to have the United States join a conference of neutral nations for the purpose of bringing about peace in Europe.

Mr. Ford's announcement was made after he had held a conference today with Madame Rosika Schwimmer of Budapest, who is here in the interests of the neutral nations conference plan. He said he was heartily in favor of the movement.

NOTED SPEAKER FROM TORONTO COMING HERE

Recruiting Committee arranging for meetings—**B. R. Macaulay on Executive.**

The committee of the Patriotic Fund held a meeting in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon. A committee of which Thomas Bell was made convenor was appointed to look after the financial matters of the recent campaign for additional funds.

The recruiting committee also met in the rooms and the work chiefly accomplished was the arrangements for the formation of the new 115th Battalion. Lt.-Col. Wedderburn was present and expressed his views on the battalion now recruiting. The matter of the Rev. J. E. Burke of Toronto to whom an invitation had been sent, requesting him to address a meeting in St. John, was brought up and found that in his reply he mentioned the dates of January 2nd or 3rd. It was decided to have him speak on Sunday, January 2nd.

B. R. Macaulay was added to the executive.

A course of instruction in siege artillery will be held at Halifax commencing December 7. Applications must be made December 1, and be recommended by officer commanding unit.

GERMAN SUBMARINES GETTING SUPPLIES ON MOROCCAN COAST
Spanish Government to Exercise Greater Vigilance as Result of Information Received from England.

Madrid, via Paris, Nov. 19.—El Imparcial says the Spanish government, in consequence of representations by Great Britain, has increased its watchfulness against German submarines being supplied from the Moroccan or Spanish coasts.

It is common knowledge in Spain that the government has never been able to prevent smuggling, especially of tobacco, and that many adventurous seamen make a living by running cargoes of contraband in small sailing craft. The residents of the adjacent coasts protect the smugglers, and hence the government, it is believed, will have great difficulty in preventing the illicit outfitting of German and Austrian submarines.

A despatch to the Paris Journal from Madrid Wednesday said that Great Britain had requested Spain to keep a strict watch along the coast line, especially that of Morocco, to prevent violations of neutrality by German and Austrian agents, who were believed to be supplying submarines with fuel and food.

WILL NOT SERIOUSLY AFFECT SAILINGS FROM NEW YORK TO ITALY

New York, Nov. 19.—The Austro-German submarine campaign in the Mediterranean will make but little difference in sailings from New York to Italian ports and cause but slight rearrangement of schedules, steamship agents announced today. A statement to the effect that all sailings from Italian ports had been cancelled, attributed last night to Hartfield, Solar & Company, agents of the Italian line, was denied by the firm today.

The Duca degli Abruzzi, for which this firm is agent, will sail November 24, and will be followed, after short intervals by the Verona, and the Europa.

The sailings of the American and the Palermo from Italy to this port are the only cancellations of this line, it was said. These have been reported. Other sailings of passenger liners for Italian ports scheduled for the near future are the San Guglielmo of the Pierce line, the Caserta of the Lloyd Italiano line and the Giuseppe Verdi, which is due to leave here next Wednesday.

Members of 104th Battalion preparing for winter quarters.

Camp Sussex, Nov. 19.—It has been decided to send C Co. of the 104th to Fredericton early tomorrow morning, and the men of the company will probably be aroused some time before daylight to be in readiness for transportation by special train. Lieut.-Col. Fowler, who by the way had Col. Thecomb, of Halifax, as guest yesterday, left for that city today to address the recruiting rally there. He was accompanied by Lieut. H. P. Davies, as assistant adjutant, and Capt. Rev. G. Lawrence, chaplain of the battalion. Lieut. Davies was with General Steele for about eight years and wears two medals for service in the South African war.

Arrangements have been made to give the boys a good reception in Fredericton, and, although they have been made as comfortable as possible while in camp, they all seem glad to know that they are now to give up life under canvas for a time. Their conduct here has been exemplary throughout, and there can be no doubt that they will maintain their reputation for orderliness and a desire to get in form for the work before them. Indeed, good words are to be said in favor of the whole battalion in these respects. There have been only a few cases of misconduct, which speaks well for a unit only recently formed.

Some transfers to different companies, and other battalions may, of course, be made from time to time as occasion may require. As already stated the battalion is considerably over strength and there will be plenty of material for filling the ranks of the 140th, already now practically at half strength. It has not just at present been decided when D Co. will proceed to Woodstock, but there seems little doubt that early next week will be selected as it is getting too cold now for living in the open. A and B companies will also be leaving camp at an early date for the same reason, and the buildings for their accommodation are now about ready. It may be remarked, in passing, that some of the boys of these two companies, a number of whom come from St. John and places near that city, feel a little disappointed at the prospect of their not being located in St. John, to be near their relatives and friends. This is about the only matter approaching complaint if complaint it can be called, that the boys are heard to speak about as an adverse factor in their lot. On all hands appreciation is expressed of the treatment and example of their officers.

The clothing, food and general accommodation has been made the subject of special attention. With regard to the food it must be said that it is of good quality and plentiful. More than 2,000 pounds of bread alone have been consumed weekly by the battalion during the past month or so. Meats and vegetables are of a high standard, and are provided in sufficient quantity. All the tents have wood flooring and are provided with oil stoves, so that notwithstanding the recent cold weather it has been possible for the men to live with a degree of comfort that does not fall to the lot of many a soldier.

Nothing of special interest occurred in camp today. The usual drill and exercises were gone through, but a feature worth noticing was the excellent way in which the detached companies of recruits, all new men, got through their work. The dance given by the officers' mess at the Maplehurst Hotel last night was a most enjoyable event, about seventy officers and ladies being present. The dance was held in honor of the officers of C and D companies now about to leave the camp.

PROMOTING TRADE AFTER THE WAR

London, Nov. 19.—(Gazette Cable)—The Council of the London Chamber of Commerce is daily considering proposals having for their object the promoting of trade after the war is concluded, between Britain, her overseas dominions and her present allies, as against enemy countries. It is likely that the council will shortly consult representatives having special commercial knowledge of the various dominions.

TRANSPORT DRIVERS NEEDED.

Lieut. Col. B. R. Armstrong has been informed that the Imperial authorities have requested that 2,000 skilled mechanical transport drivers be enlisted for service with the Imperial army. The general officer commanding at Halifax has to report today the probable number of men that can be raised in the Maritime Provinces. Applicants must be mechanical transport drivers, not only well qualified to drive motor cars and trucks, but also able to make the necessary repairs. All applicants will be enrolled with a view to examination at a later date, when the number to be enlisted in the Maritime Provinces is determined.

The rate of pay is \$45.00 per month to unmarried men, and \$55.25 to married men, with additional allowance for children. This is in addition to free rations, clothing and accommodation.

No Church Parade.

There will not be any church parade of the 52nd Battalion on Sunday next, but a drum head service will be held in the armories instead. The service will be at 9 a. m., and the armories will be thrown open to all civilians.
