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MUSTN'T SEND INFLAMMABLES THROUGH MAILS

Post Office Department Warns Offenders That It is a Prison Offence.

Ottawa, March 12—A bulletin issued by the post office department states: "Notwithstanding the urgent and repeated warnings of the post office department against the mailing of matches and other inflammable articles in the mails, the practice still continues, and the department is now referring such cases to the criminal authorities for prosecution."

Under the Post Office Act, Section 128, the sending of inflammable or explosive articles in the mails is an indictable offence and renders the offender liable to imprisonment for five years.

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SODDEN DEATH OF NOTED INVENTOR

George Westinghouse, Who Revolutionized Railroadings With His Air Brake, Dies at 68.

New York, March 12—George Westinghouse died suddenly here this afternoon. He had been suffering with a long complaint for three months.

Mr. Westinghouse was sixty-eight years old and was perhaps best known as the inventor of the air brake which bears his name and which revolutionized railroadings in this country.

The air brake which he invented is used throughout the civilized world and in almost every part of the globe there are great plants which he founded.

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
