**Reginald Peacock's Death.**  
A letter received from Private Alfred Henderson, of the 26th Battalion, who was one of the gallant band of thirty, that charged the German crater, October 18, was received Saturday morning. The wounded hero is in a hospital outside of Edinburgh, with a wound in my leg just above the ankle. The bullet went right through, fracturing the leg, but not badly. I am fortunate to be near Edinburgh, as you know my aunt lives there, and it will seem more like home to have her near. I am anxious for McPhee and a few others of them, as I heard that McPhee had been killed. (Note: The casualty list has the name of Howard McPhee, killed in action—News Ed.)  
"After I came into our trench the stretcher-bearers dressed my wound and then put me in the dug-out of the sergeant-major to wait there until they had time to take me out."  
"While I was waiting, a shell burst a couple of yards from me and a piece of shrapnel struck Reggie Peacock and down he went. The stretcher-bearer

told me that Reg. had been hit in the leg and that no bones were broken. They started to carry him out in a blanket and then two fellows carried him out on their backs, each taking a turn on the stretcher, carrying Reggie on the way out." (Peacock was fatally hit, but the stretcher-bearer kept the news from Henderson in order that it would not jeopardize his chances of recovery. When the fellows carrying the stretcher passed on the way out it is altogether likely that the spirit of the gallant warrior had passed over to the silent majority.) Henderson says that he was writing lying on the ground of his back and his leg bandaged with splints.

## PEJEPSCOT MILL

### BURNED DOWN

LOSS OF \$50,000

The big saw mill of the Pejepscot Lumber Company at Salmon River, St. John County, was destroyed by fire Friday evening with a loss roughly estimated at \$50,000. The fire was confined to the mill.

The alarm from the mill sounded at 9.45 o'clock, and almost simultaneously the mill ceased to burn. In fifteen minutes it was practically destroyed. There is nothing to indicate how the fire started.

It was seen that there was no fire in the mill, and that the fire was concentrated on the surrounding property. In the immediate vicinity was the conveyor, a large pile of lumber and the buildings of the mill village but all were saved by the energetic efforts of the men.

It is believed that the value of the property destroyed was about \$50,000, but information regarding this and also the insurance is not in the New York office. Apart from the direct damage there will be a heavy loss in the interruption of work and it will be a serious thing for the 100 to 150 men who have been employed there, and their families.
