Province, as you are no doubt well acquainted with their histo They have been struggling for years, and, consequently, have not had a chance to acquire as much of the material wealth as English speaking people; therefore, their means being limited, they have been unable to keep up with the other races in the matter of education.

They are, however, for these last few years, making good progress, and, without any boasting on their part, have been faithful to their God and Country.

As one of the Provincial Directors of this society,
I am taking the liberty upon myself, to-day, to write you this
ter, knowing that you are closely connected, or have been, with
the Rockfeller Foundation, and also a good friend of ours other
wise, I wish to ask you if it is not possible to have the good of our society considered by the Rockfeller Foundation.

I can assure you, Mr. King, that if you could succeed in obtaining a contribution-let it be what it will-it will certs ly be appreciated by the Acadians, as well as by those of the whole Province.

Hoping that you are well after your strenuous session, and seeing that things are looking our way at Ottawa, which will not be too soon in the interest of Canada, and thanking you for copies of Hanzard, with your speech, received some days ago, wit my congratulations, I remain
