

dog salmon supply for winter use. The application for Qualadi was not recommended, because the Indians would not go there in any event. At Zaladis the Indians had all the land that they reasonably required, for which reason this application was not endorsed. The old village sites referred to were already included in the Keogh Reserve. A large number of dog salmon ran every year in the river at Natl-taa-yu, and if a five acre fishing station were granted there it would be quite sufficient for all the requirements of the Indians, the five acres recommended to be at the mouth of the river running through T.L. No. 13090. That place would make a very good dog salmon fishing station for the Tancokeuch Band. The application for Mound Island was not recommended, as the land applied for had already been alienated by Crown Grant. Nor was the Aktudis application endorsed as the Indians could get all the salmon they wanted in the land covered by Pulp Lease without any special privileges being allotted.

Taking up next the application of the Gilford Island or Tachwastineuch Band, "B1" was not recommended. As to "B2" (Iakwai), he recommended that 10 acres be granted on the eastern shore of Charles Creek at its mouth, all the land on the western shore having been alienated. The Waselis application (B3) was not recommended. With respect to Natl-ki (B4), the land asked for was apparently open and he recommended that 10 acres be granted, as quite sufficient for the requirements of the Indians, on the eastern side of Belle Isle Sound, near its mouth, just north of Timber Limit No. 14690, for a fishing station. There was also a small grass flat there, where the Indians camped when going trapping. Some of them trapped there every year. The application for Awak-gla-laa and Leik were not recommended, the lands asked for having in each case been alienated. At Kawages it was almost a precipitous mountain, with a small flat at the bottom, this place
