

## BIBLIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

THE principal authority for material on Joseph Brant is William L. Stone's *Life of Joseph Brant* (Thayendanegea), 2 vols. (1838). This includes an account of the border wars of the American Revolution and sketches of the Indian campaigns of Generals Harmar, St Clair, and Wayne. A brief biography entitled *Memoir of Captain Joseph Brant*, 'compiled from authentic records,' was published anonymously in Brantford in 1872. *History of Brant County* (1883), Part II, pages 85-149, is devoted almost exclusively to Brant and his family. Samuel G. Drake's *Biography and History of the Indians of North America from its First Discovery* has one chapter (pp. 577-93) given exclusively to Brant. The chapter in the same work dealing with Red Jacket will also be found of interest to the student of Brant's career. William L. Stone, Jr.'s *Life and Times of Sir William Johnson*, 2 vols. (1865), contains much valuable information regarding the events which shaped the early career of Brant. B. B. Thatcher in his *Indian Biography*, 2 vols., dismisses Brant with an unsympathetic and prejudiced paragraph, but several of his chapters, particularly the one
