Reference is made to the late Mrs. Dunlop who, for many years previous to her death in October, 1889, had occupied the position of first Directress, and whose latter years in life were spent in the advancement of the Institution in all its schemes for good. Her name will be handed down in future years, as the Mother of this Board : and her later work is a substantial legacy of her earnest and successful endeavor for the comfort of the inmates of the "Home," and it is but fitting tribute, that the new hospital for the sick of the Home will be known as "The Dunlop Infirmary."

To Mrs. MacMurchy, who was called to her rest in August, 1889, and who for many years was a faithful member of the Board of Management. The efficient aid which she lent to the conduct of the business of the "Home," will make her loss much felt in its future labors: while all who were privileged to be associated with her, recall the reverent and Christ-like spirit expressed in the prayers so often offered in behalf of the work in which she was so much interested.

To the late Mrs. Munro (Matron of the "Home" since its formation in 1860) whose life seemed dedicated to her work, and to whose untiring efforts is due the high condition of the efficiency which is found in its interior to-day, and which was further evidenced in the legacy of all her possessions, —being many things greatly valued by herself, —and in money \$130.75. The many touching scenes of grief witnessed at her interment, were evidence of how much the "Boys" felt the loss of one, who had acted to them as a mother for so many years; and they feel sure that her kindly Christian influence will bear much fruit in many families in years to come.

To the late Mr. Wm. Gooderham, whose time and money were always at their disposal, and who was at all times willing to lend a helping hand in time of need; and they wish to place on record through this medium, their heartfelt thankfulness for his many good works, and all due honor to one whose name will never be forgotten in this city.

And to the late Mrs. Annie McKay, who has done much in her position in the "Home" to add to the welfare of the "Boys" under her charge.

The opportunities for work are still as apparent,—the field continues getting larger, and they pray that God may commend their work to like good people as those, and lead them to help
