The most famous private chapel in New York belongs to Mrs. Josephine Hecker, widow of George V. Hecker and sister-in-law of the distinguished Paulist, the late Rev. Isaac Hecker. Mrs. Hecker moved into her present nome in 1868, and for years the brilliant and gifted radical lived with her family When Mrs. Hecker's health became delicate as to interrupt her church life she arranged to have a private chapel in the house. Father Hecker designed the little altar, collected the decorative furniture and secured from Pope Pius IX, the right to solemnize church ser vices in the little chapel, a privilege to house, from village to village, from Portel to St. Etienne and Etaples, never before granted a foreigner.
