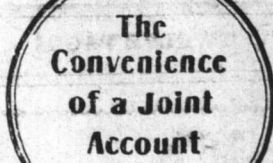

REFORM THE SENATE

Says the Toronto Star (Liberal): "If we could feel quite sure the Borden Government would abolish the Senate, if the Senate, we think, needs killing, and we would be glad to see the Borden or any other cabinet abolish it. These 5 days would be joyous ones to us if these two orders were to be in the order named."

The Star is partly right and partly wrong.

The Senate on the other hand is not need decapitation, but it is in need of reformation.

As it is many men get in the cause they have done too much service to be ignored, but at wanted in the active arena.

Others who have wealth and been big contributors to campaigns. It is very seldom, indeed, a man has got there solely on his own merits.

In fact in nine-tenths of the when it is announced that a Senator has passed to the great beyond, people wonder who he was and how he got there.

The abuses outlined have been used by both parties, and both parties should join in changing the conditions of affairs.

It is not desirable to have them in the Upper Chamber a set of sponges in so far as the people concerned. They should be made to go to the polls just as those in seats in the Commons have to.

A man thinks a whole lot of regard to his actions when he is that in a comparatively short time he will again have to face voters.

For instance at the end of last session upon the nod of Sir W. Laurier the Grit Senate majority led some most important legislation inaugurated by the Borden Government.

That sort of thing should be ended and killed hard.

TWO OBSTRUCTIONIST FAHOODS.

The Liberal obstructionists, those Grit papers backing them very well aware that they dare present the actual situation and they have resorted to the manufacture of two deliberate fabrications.

1. They assert that the Borden policy with regard to the Navy is one of continual cash contributions.

2. They allege that the Borden plan imperils Canadian auto and self respect.

As to the first claim regarding "contribution" end of it. In no such thing has been proposed.

Mr. Borden emphasized this most clearly in the House when he said:

"I say, in the first place, that not a penny of contribution and I say, in the second place, that the Bill itself clearly bears on its face the assertion of the Premier. The proposed Dreadnoughts will be to Canada and can be recalled to Dominion at any time on due notice. The Montreal Herald, one of few Liberal papers which has its head and told the truth, of the present embargo, is not to admit the facts and says of the course of an editorial:—

"No student of Canadian naval history but must have the most respect for Sir Wilfrid Laurier, based, as it is, on rivalled parliamentary expertise and influenced by the highestceptions of statesmanship. You must confess that we find it difficult to follow the reasoning which he reaches the conclusion in the fact of the declaration of the Prime Minister and the Prime Minister, which we have got that the building of these ships Britain, and the leading of the Admiralty until such as we may choose to recall to form part of a Canadian navy, is the beginning of a policy of material contributions that may peril our autonomy."
