Alward was conspicuously the giant of the 133rd. He was 6 ft. 4 inches tall, weighed 220 pounds, and of muscular build. He enlisted in the former 133rd as Pioneer Sergeant. APPLY CLOSURE AND PASS BILL

C. N. R. Purchase Measure Adopted After Long Day's Debate

THE THIRD READING
 Bill is Ready for Consideration of Members of The Senate

Ottawa, Friday, Aug. 31.—The bill providing for the acquisition of the common stock of the Canadian Northern Railway Company, not already in the possession of the Government, was passed in the Commons this morning and is now ready for consideration by the Senate. The long day's debate, in which some two dozen members participated, came to an end under the closure rule at 2 o'clock and the vote on the motion for third reading was taken.

The discussion during the sitting unlike that of Tuesday, when the closure terminated consideration of the measure in Committee of the Whole, was marked by speeches by leaders on both sides. For the Government, Sir Thomas White and Hon. Arthur Meighen were both heard, and from the Opposition benches Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke. Before the notice of the Government's intention to apply the closure was given on Wednesday night the suggestion was made that, if the Opposition would give an assurance that the debate on the third reading would not be protracted by obstructive methods, beyond the Thursday sitting the time limit of 20 minutes would not be enforced. No such assurance was forthcoming and notice of closure was given.

The leader of the Opposition, when he arose to address the House, announced that he would confine his remarks to the twenty minutes set

BRITAIN NOT TO DISCONTINUE PURCHASE OF CANADA'S BACON

Government Will Place Importations Through a Single Organization of the Ministry—Buying Agencies to be Established

London, Aug. 31.—The King yesterday signed a proclamation prohibiting the importation of bacon, butter, hams and lard except under license.

The object of this action is to enable the Government to take over the entire purchase of the import articles enumerated and concentrate the purchase in various countries into single organization. The Food Ministry is establishing in the United States a single buying agency, and will make all purchases through this agency, beginning September 3. All holders at the present time of c.i.f. and f.o.b. contracts in bacon and lard with American shippers are required to furnish to the Food Ministry full information immediately.

Pending further arrangements, licenses will be granted certain importers of bacon, ham and lard from other countries than the United States to continue imports. Consignments of Canadian bacon will be under the same restrictions as American goods. Imported in behalf of the Food Ministry, they will be distributed through the ordinary channels at fixed terms as to commission and profits, thus protecting the public.

A statement issued by the Food Ministry says: "It should be borne in mind that importers' prices are mainly determined by the market prices ruling in foreign countries, over which the Food Controller has no control and
