Messrs M. and C. Riley of town have received memorial cards from Mr. John Chapman of the great lake steamer "Harvester," in commemoration of the deaths of Capt. Owens, John Tait, Chas. Rayburn and the crew of the ill-fated "H. B. Smith," that foundered on Lake Superior on the 9th of Nov. last. Mr. Chapman has written a few original verses relative to the awful disaster. It will be remembered that the late Mr. Tait was a half brother of Mrs. M. and Mrs. C. Riley, and that the late Chas. Rayburn, was a cousin of Miss McWilliams.

Horse Broke Its Neck.

Mr. Wm. Anderson of Round Lake lost a horse in a peculiar manner on Friday of last week. The animal was standing in front of H. Williams' store, when an auto coming around the corner, startled the beast so badly that it jumped sideways and bolted for freedom. It struck the corner of the store in its career, narrowly escaping the plate glass window, and plunged head first into Mr. Williams' shed. The force of the compact broke the animal's neck and it dropped dead. The horse was totally blind, but nevertheless a good worker and quite valuable.
