a conference with General Man-
ager Graham on Friday before
he returned to Lawrencetown.
He had been at Truro where a
conference was held of Farmers
Associations and Agricultural
Societies of the Maritime Pro-
vinces relative to future work
and assistance the different pro-
vinces might obtain from the
government Federal and Pro-
vincial to carry on the work. As
agriculture is the basic indus-
try of the Maritime Provinces
any line of co-operative work
at this time should be assisted
and encouraged. Mr. Messenger
was also at Halifax consulting
with agents and officials of the
railways in reference to favor-
able freight rates he having
been appointed on a committee
while at Truro for that pur-
pose.
