Funeral.
The funeral of the late Mrs. C. G. Aguire, on Thursday afternoon, was very largely attended. The sad procession left the house preceded by the brethren of the Oddfellows Lodge, of which Mr. Aguire is a member, and proceeded to the Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Service preached an impressive sermon to a congregation which filled the church to the doors. The remains were laid in the vault with every mark of love and respect from those who had assembled to take part in the last sad rite to one so universally beloved in our village.

Nobly Done.
The people of Farmersville, irrespective of church distinctions, have expressed sympathy with the pastor of the Methodist Church in his present time of trial in an exceedingly practical and commendable manner. On Monday an address of condolence was sent to Rev. Mr. Rogers at Montreal, accompanied by a present of \$100, which we are sure he will find very acceptable at this time. His son is yet in a very precarious condition, although there has been no change for the worse during the last week. As there was a considerable surplus in the hands of the committee after handing Mr. Rogers the cheque for \$100, it was unanimously resolved to present the balance to Mrs. Rogers, as a slight token of the esteem in which she is held by her neighbors and friends.

Annual School Meeting.
The annual school meeting for the village public school was held in the school house, on the 29th Dec. H. H. Arnold was voted to the chair and G. W. Green to the position of secretary. The minutes of the last annual school meeting, the report of the trustees and auditors were read, discussed and adopted. On motion Geo. W. Green was appointed auditor for the following year. T. G. Stevens and R. D. Judson were nominated for trustees for 1887. Considerable discussion arose as to the mode of voting, but it was finally decided to vote at that meeting and by ballot. After the vote had been taken and counted, the chairman declared that T. G. Stevens had been duly elected. The meeting then adjourned. contained the names of 890 voters. The voters' list for 1886, upon which we have just voted, contains 680 names, an increase of 110. But of the 890 citizens who in 1860 had the right to exercise the franchise, 280 no longer appear on the list, over a third of whom are lying beneath the sod, while the remainder are scattered over the continent. The figures on the voters' list to-day show an increase of 290; but of the 680 now entitled to the franchise, only 107 voted at the municipal election in 1860.

POULTRY.—Chickens are in demand at from 30 to 35c. per pair; ducks, 6 to 7c. per pound. Turkeys are wanted at from 8 to 10c.
POTATOES.—These tubers are plentiful at from 30 to 35c.
RUTA BAGAS.—A few bags would find quick sale at 85c.
BEANS range from \$1 to \$1.10.
WOOD.—Dry hard wood, \$3; dry soft wood, \$2 to \$2.25.
OSIONS wanted at 90c to \$1.

FORTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY.
We clip the following from the Republic, published at Geneseo, Henry Co., Ill., and which refers to a former well-known resident of Leeds Co., Mr. Pomeroy, who lived for a number of years at Greenbush, in Elizabethtown. His wife, formerly Miss Nellie Sherman, was a sister of Aaron Sherman, for many years a resident of Farmersville and vicinity.

On Nov. 11th, 1841, a brisk young man of twenty years, from Fairfield, New York, took the hand of his fair bride of seventeen years at her home in Elizabethtown, Canada. The bride's name was Miss Nellie Sherman, and the parties were no other than Mr. and Mrs. George Pomeroy, honored citizens of Colonia to-day.

They are the parents of five sons and five daughters, of whom six are living. viz: Mrs. Levina A. Reese, of Colonia; Mr. Amasa Pomeroy, of Orion; Mrs. Almira A. Hanna, of Colonia; Mr. Emory A. Pomeroy, of Arizona, and Messrs. Chas. A. and Edward C. Pomeroy of Colonia. James F. died in 1842, and M. Maria, in 1873; also Levina M. Mann, a niece and adopted daughter has made her home with them for thirteen years.

They moved from Canada to Orion, Ill., in 1853, here they resided for eleven years. Then they lived in Jasper county, Iowa, four years and in their present home sixteen years.

On the morning of the 11th inst. the old couple strayed unwearily down street to Mr. Reese's, when they were told that Mr. D. Kelcher had come. "Well," says Mrs. Pomeroy, "I have plenty of bread and cake, but I haven't any pie." So home they went carrying a borrowed pie, when, lo! they found their relatives and friends to the number of nearly sixty, tables groaning with plenty of spare. Never was a surprise more complete. Their pastor, Rev. D. C. Martin, made some touching and pertinent remarks to the happy pair; Rev. S. H. Weed read their biography, and Mr. Martin led in prayer, and then in the name of the many gathered friends presented her an elegant china set, and him a gold-headed cane. Then of jokes and of social chat there was a harvest, and of good things there was a feast. This lasted the whole day, other friends coming constantly, and a house full of young folks made the home cheerful and joyous till late in the evening. All say, may they have many more happy years.
