FATAL RAILWAY WRECK
Three Men Killed in an Accident Near Fraserville, Ont.
THE TRAIN STRUCK A COW.
Thirteen Cars Were Ditched and Piled Up in a Confused Mass Beside the Track—The Engineer, Fireman and Brakeman Were the Victims.
LENDON, Ont., Sept. 24.—On Saturday a special freight train, in charge of Conductor Fred Russell, ran over a cow when coming near Fraserville. The engine was thrown over its side, burying beneath it Robert Johnson, the engineer, Nicholas Maloney, the fireman, and George Greenbury, a brakeman. There were 13 cars on the train and every one of them was thrown from the track and piled up in a heap. Some of the cars went over an adjoining track. The ill-fated special was composed of thirteen cars and a van in charge of Conductor Russell and left Lindsay at 2:10 Saturday morning. The accident occurred at a crossing about a mile and a half south of Fraserville and was caused by a cow lying on the track. As soon as they struck the animal the engine turned sideways on the track and the 13 cars piled up in a confused mass on top of her. All three were terribly scalded. It was nearly noon before the unfortunate men were saved from the wreckage. Maloney was still alive when taken out, but died a few moments after. He spoke a few words and said "good bye" to Conductor Russell before he expired. Johnson formerly lived in Port Hope, but has resided for some years in Lindsay, and was elected deputy reeve of the town last municipal election. He was a member of the Durham Lodge L. O. O. F., and a son of Mr. John Maloney, Port Hope, and his father, master and brother (who live in the United States) mourn his loss. Both were well known and esteemed among their friends and the employees of the road as right good fellows. Greenbury, who was lying at half past one, was a good citizen. Engineer Robert Johnson has been a member of our town council for many years. As a Fireman he was elected deputy reeve by acclamation. He was a man of fine presence, a good speaker and possessed of a magnetic personality. His name has more than once been mentioned as mayor for 1895. A little more than two years ago John Johnson was terribly scalded in a railway accident and was not able to work for some months. In religion Mr. Johnson was a Methodist and a politician a Conservative.

DEATH IN A FIRE.
The Batt House, at Fort Stanley, Burned to the Ground.
PORT STANLEY, Ont., Sept. 24.—The Batt House, at Fort Stanley, was burned to the ground. The fire started in the night and spread with such rapidity that the inmates, which all escaped in their night clothes with the exception of the police inspector, had no time to prepare. It appears to have been ignited by a fire from the trunk of the body was found wrapped in the blankets of his bed.
The fire soon spread to the barn and stable, and the entire building was burned. The fire was caused by a stove. An inquest will be held by Coroner Giesin, of St. Thomas.

TO BE HANGED DEC. 14.
Joseph Truskey, the Murderer of Constable Lindsay, Sentenced.
WRENSHOP, Sept. 24.—Joseph Truskey, who was found guilty of the murder of Constable Lindsay of Tilbury Centre on May 8 last, was sentenced on Saturday to be hanged in Sandwich Jail on December 14. In pronouncing sentence Mr. Justice Robertson told the prisoner that he could hold out no hope of executive clemency, and that he had better lose no time in preparing himself for the fate that awaits him.
This is the first instance in which Mr. Justice Robertson has sentenced a prisoner to death and he followed the fashion of other judges of late in not donning the black cap.
When Truskey was searched before being conveyed to the cells there were found on his person over two plugs of tobacco and a sharp steel instrument.
The disreputable character of the prisoner and his assistants, the prisoner had evidently been tampered with in the afternoon, and these articles were taken from him. As Truskey nearly killed himself when arrested, and as he has several times since been heard to express his determination to defend justice to the last instrument combat, he has been given him for no other purpose than that of self-defence.
