······ WRECKED NEAR PUEBLO

Crowded Cars of World's Fair Flyer Drop Through Bridge.

Number Killed Unknown-Seventy-Siz Bedies Already Recovered-Two Crowded Passenger Cars and a Baggage Car Engulfed in Torrent in Dry Creez, and Only Three of Those in These Care

Pueblo, Col., Aug. 9 .- The wreck of the World's Fair Flyer on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad, near Eden, seven miles north of Pueblo. Sunday evening, proves to have been one of the greatest railroad disasters in the history of the country. Two crowded passenger cars and a baggage car were engulfed in the torrent that tore out a trestle spanning Steele's Hollow, otherwise known as Dry Creek, and so far as was known last night only three of the oc-Fortunately two sleeping cars and a diner completing the train remained on the track at the edge of the abyss and none of their occupants were killed or injured. How many perished probably never will be definitely ascertained, for the treacherous sands are drifting over the bodies.

Searching for the dead was begun about midnight on an extensive scale and was still in progress last night. All the corpses found were brought to Pueblo and placed in four morgues here. At 8 o'clock last evening seventy-six bodies had been recover. ed, and of these forty-nine had been Fortunately two sleeping cars and a

identified. During the day bodies
were recovered all the way along
Fountain River from the scene of the
wreck to this city. At 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon two bodies were
taken from the stream at First
street, Pueblo, more than eight miles
from the point where the disaster occurred, and it is probable that some
may be even recovered farther down
stream.

None of the bodies are badly mutilated, and all are in such condition as to be recognizable. Many identifications have been made by articles found on the bodies, no persons who viewed them recognizing the features.

BALFOUR WAS FOR PEACE. Thought Knight Commander Might Very Easily Have Developed Into Something

Serious_Secretary Hay's Declaration.

Lendon, Aug. 9.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Premier Bal-feur, replying to a question on the subject, said the British Government adhered ttq its contention that there was no adequate justification for the sinking of the British steamer Knight Commander by the Vladivostock Commander by the Vladivostock

sinking of the British steamer Knight Commander by the Vladivostock squadron.

The Premier made a general statement of the Government's views on the Malacca and the Knight Commander incidents. He pointed out that the Government's objection to the seizure of the Malacca was based entirely on the British contention that ships issuing from the Black Sea under the commercial flag of Russia were incompetent to transport themselves into cruisers.

"We remonstrated, therefore, very strongly with the Russian Government, and they showed a desire to meet us," continued Mr. Balfour, but an important thing to remember is that it is an entirely new issue. It is the first time any such incident has occurred since the Treaty of Paris, or the Treaty of London, on which our objection is based, have come into existence. If the Russian Government was right in its contention, the centers of the Malacca. come into existence.
