## HAS A SENSE OF HUMOR

LORD MOUNT-STEPHEN, FORMER CANADIAN CHAIRMAN.

Delighted in Retelling Humorous Stories, But As President of the C.P.R. Has Faced Many a Serious Situation With Both Calmness and Anxiety—His Lordship Never Forgets Friends—Celebrates 78th Birthday.

"The poor-house or a palace," was the exclamation of Lord Mount-Stephen when he put his hand to the construction of the C. P. R.

It proved to be a palace on Drummond street, in which His Lordship, who was seventy-eight years of age a week or two ago, dispensed a noble hospitality.

Lord Mount-Stephen was originally a dry goods clerk. He came of wholesome stock, but like so many eminent Scots, he was of the people.

By hard work, the patient watching of opportunity, he grew in wealth and power. His association with his cousin, Lord Strathcona, in the old St. Paul and Manitoba Railway, and his later connection with the C. P. R., were the first two large things which he grasped when the opportunity came his way.

His Lordship never lost his native simplicity. Fresh of color, springy of step, clear of eye, he walks briskly, stopping to talk to this or that friend or acquaintance.

His Lordship dearly loved a joke, and his laughter was infectious. He had, of course, good reason to be an optimist, but temperamentally he was very buoyant and light of heart. He could be tremendously serious, too, and as president of the C. P. R., he has faced many a serious situation with calmness, but also with anxiety.

He had, however, the pawk Scottish humor, and he loved to spring a joke or a story upon his friends. He would button-hole an old friend on the street, and say to him—"Come into my office. I have something important to tell you." And then, with great solemnity, he would tell his story, which was enhanced in value by the owl-like seriousness with which the narration was made.

When His Lordship was president of the C. P. R. he liked, in the relaxed moment, to get off little jokes upon the officers.

In this position he won respect and admiration. The system was nothing like what it is today, but the duties were exceedingly onerous for all that, while the fact that the system was just getting on its feet, so to say, made the position of president anything but a sinecure.

His Lordship rarely forgot a face. He could instantly recall the name or face of any person whom he had seen in the past.

And there was this fine thing about His Lordship—he never forgot his friends. All the people with whom he was intimate, were sure of a hearty handshake, while those indeed were honored in the most delicate manner.

His Lordship, indeed, delighted to do good by way of surprise. He loved to be the unknown benefactor. It could be said of His Lordship with perfect truth, that he "did good by stealth and blushed to find it fame."

He used to wear a tweed suit, which he did not change too often; but after his elevation to the peerage he became a little more particular, and invariably wore a silk hat, galloons over his patent leathers, and kid gloves. Not that there was any change in his manner to old Canadians. Indeed, he always insisted, when among his intimates, upon being called by his Christian name. He was exceedingly thoughtful of the comfort of all who were in any way dependent on him, and in his business career he was always willing that the "other fellow" should have a chance. He would put a good thing in the way of a friend. He had the art of turning what he touched into gold, but he did not want all the gold for himself.

The Royal Victoria Hospital at Montreal will constitute an imperishable monument to his generosity.

For many years past, Lord Mount-Stephen has made his home in England. He remarried there, and has several country seats in addition to a New London residence. He divided some years ago, among his relatives, a large sum of something like five millions, in order that he might see the effect of the disbursement while still in life.

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Mental Discoveries.

Dr. A. H. Abbott of the University recently gave a lecture on "Experimental Investigation of Complex Mental Discoveries." At the outset the professor said that experimental investigation of the complex facts of man's existence was in its youth, particularly in Canada and the United States. The science of experimental psychology began as a serious science only between the years 1860 and 1870. So far as the sciences were concerned psychology was behind the times.

The professor discussed the complex elements of psychology, thinking, emotion and volition. He said psychology was attempting to discover how complex the complex mental states really were. In order to do this one essential factor was time, and he pictured on a screen some results from this method. He mentioned one general point: that from the psychology of elements it was reasonably clear that there were qualities, sensations, which were not dependent on physical or physiological conditions. Every mental state was not produced by brain processes. He used illustrations of lines and color to show that the task he set had something to do with the audience's experience, and that if a task be set it would control the associations or imagination. Imagination gave the meaning to what was called real objects.

Dr. Abbott further illustrated his lecture to show that as in the investigation of thinking, so in the investigation of evidence, the task controlled the associations or imagination, and emotions were controlled by imagination.
