Attorney General Gibson and Sir Wm Mulock Said to be Hot-Foot After Plums.

Ottawa, June 1 .- (Special.) - The rumor is current in political circles here that Attorney-General J. M. Gibson is contemplating retiring from the provincial cabinet as soon as possible, and is endeavoring to secure the ap-pointment to the unfilled position of chief justice of the new exchequer division of the high court. The recent visit of the attorney-general to Ottawa is now understood to have that object in view, and it is not secret that considerable influence is being brought to bear upon the government to provide Mr. Gibson with a berth of that

Sir William Mulock is also said to have been making eyes at the position, but it is believed among lawyers that his qualifications for the job, in a legal sense, are by no means exceptional.
