fest Famous of Nurses, 85 Years Old Longs to Take Part In Manchu-

rian Red Cross Work. Florence Nightingal, heroine of many loody battlefields, and the most fanous nurse in the world, recent'y celebrated her 85th birthday. Old as she s, she has an intense longing to go to Manchuria and take part in the Red

Manchuria and take part in the Red Cross work there.

The Russian guns that roared fifty years ago while she was gaining a world-wide fame, are roaring still When she witnessed the fall of Sebastopool half a century ago, she little thought she would live to see the Czar's Empire expensed in another world war. thought she would live to see the CZAT's Empire engaged in another great war. Miss Nightingale is taking a deep in terest in the struggle in the Far East She watches every development the re, and is a close student of the method of the Red Cross to-day. She sees intenn the way of improvement sine lay when she started out with her band of heroic nurses to tend wor help the dying in the Crimean War.

The queen of nurses lives now in quiet little house in London, the houst that has been her home for forty yeur. It was in the homes of the poor that some of her earliest efforts in sick nursing ware made when some or the poor that some of the poor that some progressiance when the progressian transfer made when the progressiant transfer made transfer made the progressiant transfer made tra were made, when as a young woman of leisure she visited the cottages of her father's estates in Derbyshire and Hampshire. At the institution of Kal-serswerth, too, where she graduated as a nurse, her attention was chiefly di-rected toward the care of the sick poor. Her earliest writings dealt with he same theme. The appalling condithe cast during the Crimean War summoned her to the care of the solcier, and for many years afterwards she made military hospitas her chief concern. But now she turns again to her earlier work, and the sick poor are in these larer years runth or her mind. earlier work, and the sick poor are in these later years much on her mind.

Miss Nightingale, looking upon the 'home" as the grat unit of the nation feels that the chief need of the age is he intelligently managed pure, clea the intelligently managed pure, clearly home in which the men and women of the future may be reared, and regards the district nurse as an important factor in bringing about this condition. The district nurse meets the family on their own ground, shows them in their own prome how they can be clear and own home how they can be clean and orderly, how they can help in nursing orderly, how they can help in nursing their sick ones, the way to obtain official sanitary help, how to improvise aprilances, and often how to tide over difficulties and prevent their home being broken up. To use one of Miss Nightingale's expressive phrases, the district nurse can teach "without seeming to teach, which is the deal of teach." ing to teach, which is the ideal of teaching." When she hears about the erection of model municipal dwellings for the poor, Miss Nightingale invariably inquires, what effect they have on the habits of the people. She urges that the district nurse may be the medium for teaching the disorderly how to use

inproved dwellings, an important fac-tor in the struggle with what she calls "pauperized poverty."

In the early stages of her career Miss Nightingale laid great stress on the maxim that a "nurse is born and not made" and she has never flinched from that position. She holds that of ell octhat position. She holds that of all oc cupations, nursing least lends itself to a "formula," as it deals "with living a "formula," as it deals "with hiving a formula," as it deals "with hiving bodies and spirits and cannot be formulated like engineering, or numbered and registered like arithmetic and population. Miss Nightingale's view of the matter may be illustrated by one of her own characteristic examples. "A great physician was heard to say, when asked how he treated pneumonia, 'I don't treat pneumonia, 'I treat the person who has pneumonia.' If this is true in medicine; in which there is much that can be tested by examinations, how much more true is it of medicine's servant—nursing? Training—silent thing training, as well as word training, long years of training, moral and sympathetic, as well as physical training in tact and sympathy; conduct training is necessary, and progress in Miss Nightingale's view of the mat ing in tact and sympathy; conduct training is necessary, and progress in training can never end but with a nurse's life. A good nurse must be a good woman with sympathetic insight. She cannot be a good nurse without."

Miss Nightingale has always feared a danger that the office of nurse may be magnified until the proper line of demoration between nurses and the of demarcation between nurses and the or demarcation between nurses and the medical faculty is lost. To use her own terse phrase, "a nurse should be a nurse, not a medical woman," and any test of study which loses sight of this seems antagonistic to her conception of a nurse's vocation. "The most invocation practical lesson that can be mportant practical lesson that can b important practical lesson that can be given to nurses," says Miss Nightingale, "is to teach them what to observe, how to observe and how accurately to state the result of observation." THE BUREAU OF LABOR. Interesting Details In the Fifth Annual Report of the Department.

The fifth annual report of the Labor The fifth annual report of the Labor Bureau shows that during 1994 there were 54 trade disputes resulting in strikes in Ontario, involving 171 establishments and 8,945 persons. An aggregate of 878 days was covered by the strikes, the average duration of each dispute being 14.41 days, or 10.18 days per person compared with 32 discovered by the strikes, the average duration of each dispute being 14.41 days, or 10.18 days per person, compared with \$2 dis involving 429 establishments, 10,

putes, involving 429 establishments, 10,-564 persons, aggregating 994 days, an average of 12.12 days to each dispute, and 10.62 days per person in 1903.

The establishments reporting to the bureau were 174, employing 11,503 persons. The gross value of their aggregate product was \$25.714.296; the amount paid in wages \$4,400,626, an annual average earning of \$332.56 per person. The percentage labor cost of production was 17.15, as against 21.69 in 1901, and 25 in 1903.

The report includes the replies of clerks of cities, towns and villages to a circular inquiry as to the opportunity

a circular inquiry as to the opportunity existing in their municipalities. These replies are very valuable, and one can not help being struck by the variety of business opportunities throughout the Province. The plan of gathering such Province.
