R. have been alloted by the Government a block of three million acres extending to within about 25 miles of Medicine Hat and extending from theBow River on the South to the Red Deer river on the North. This is the vast area which the company are going to transform from grazing or ranch land into a thickly settled district with prosperous homes and industries.
