The winter feed is coarse fodder, such as corn stalks, wheat we can be about her fed in the such as t he has a few high graces. The states feed is coarse fodder, such as corn stalks, wheat, rye, cat, or batley hay fed night and morning, with ordinary English hay at noon. The coarse fodder is cut and ateamed about two hours in the morning. The grain is equal weights of corn and coo meal and bran, four quarts at a meal morning and night. Waters after feeding in the morning and before feeding at night. From eighteen to twenty-five cows are kept. The milk is set in large open pass, usually thirty-six hours, and at a temperature of 60 to 70 degrees.

he Changes to be made in the Recon-struction of the Ottawa Government —New Offices Added. Orrawa, April 25.—In reconstructing the government it is understood that the British system of members of the government who are not cabinet ministers will be adopted. The new officers will be members of one or other of the houses of parliament. There will be a comptroller of inland revenue having seats in parliament, without seats in the cabinet, and the ministers of inland revenue and customs will disappear. The duties of minister will be lightened by the transfer of tariff regulations to the customs and trade and commerce departments. The department of justice will be supplemented by the appointment of a solicitor OTTAWA, April 28.—In reconstru department of justice will be supplet-mented by the appointment of a solitor general. These changes are caused, it is argued, by the new duties assumed by the government in relation to the labor questions, extension of foreign trade, etc.; in future, therefore, the govern-ment will comprise 13 cabinet ministers and two members who will not sit in the cabinet.
