Died at South Devon. The death occurred at her home, South Devon, on Saturday evening of Mrs. Frances O. Titus, widow of the late Charles Titus, aged 72 years. She was one of the oldest and most highly respected residents and is survived by four sons, Arthur, Fred, Charles and Frank, all of South Devon, and three daughters, Hugh Titus and Randolph Titus, of Manchester, and James Titus, of Sherman, Me. New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest. The 230 hens in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, which is conducted at the Experimental Station, Fredericton, laid 810 eggs during the week, which brings the total to date since November 1st up to 22,424. The pen owned by R. A. Snowball, Chatham, led in production for the week with 51 eggs. The pen owned by Mrs. George Dunbar, North Devon, was in second position with a total of 49 eggs. The pen owned by A. T. Reed, Rollinsdam, still continues to lead in total production with 1892 eggs. Second position is held by A. S. C. Steven's pen with 1834 eggs. A. S. C. Steven owns the leading hen, which has a record of 237 eggs. A. S. C. Steven and W. E. B. Fair, Dorchester, own the two hens in second position which have a record of 228 eggs each.

2003 NEW PUPILS GET PERMITS FOR THE CITY SCHOOLS

The Largest Enrollment in History Expected When Schools Open To-morrow.

SIX NEW TEACHERS; THREE TO BE ABSENT

Applications for Places in New Junior High School Course Refused.

Two hundred and three permits had been issued up to noon to-day for new pupils who will enter the public schools of Fredericton, when the fall term commences to-morrow. The number is larger than usual and that, together with the capacity enrollment for the new Junior High School Course, which is being inaugurated with the opening of the new \$180,000 composite high school to-morrow, is expected to make the school attendance the largest in the history of the city. Because the accommodations are already taxed, applicants are now being refused entry to the new Junior High School course. Six new teachers will be on duty when the city schools open to-morrow, three of whom will be the staff of the vocational department of the new high school. Elmer C. Close, who succeeds C. B. Burden, who joins the high school staff, as principal of the Smythe street school will be the only new principal. Three members of the teaching staff will not be on duty when the schools open. Miss Sadie Thompson of the High School staff is ill. Miss Kate McGinn has not returned from a visit to Roway this week, and she is expected to be absent from her duties at Smythe street school.

DIED FROM INJURIES.

Mrs. Elmer Humes Never Recovered From Injuries Received When She Fell on Slippery Street in February, 1924.

The death occurred at her home, 294 University Avenue at six o'clock this morning of Mrs. Ida May Humes, wife of Elmer E. Humes, aged 52 years, as the result of injuries received when she fell on the ice on University Avenue 19 months ago. Deceased was walking on University Avenue near Charlotte street in February, 1924 when she fell on some ice receiving such injuries that she had to be taken to Victoria Hospital where she remained for five months. She was confined to her bed for some months and for a short time was able to walk with the aid of crutches. A month ago she was again taken seriously ill and passed away this morning, after 19 months illness, her spine having been paralyzed when she struck the ice. Everything that medical service and skillful nursing could do was done but to no avail. She was 52 years of age and is survived by her husband, her mother, Mrs. George Clark, four brothers, William A. Clark, Harry R. Clark, George W. Clark and Frank Clark, all of this city, and three sisters, Mrs. L. J. Donovan, of Boston, who had taken care of her sister for the past year; Mrs. Fred B. Thomas, of Somerville, Mass., who arrived here at noon to-day, and Mrs. R. M. Sutton, of this city. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon with service at the home, 294 University Avenue, at two o'clock by Very Rev. Deane Neale, assisted by Rev. A. P. Bate and interment to be made at Rural Cemetery.

Fire Chief is Convinced That Fire Sunday Morning Was of Incendiary Origin

Grocery Store of Frank C. Jewett's Establishment Guttered Just Three Months to the Day and Hour After Previous Incendiary Fire at Same Place—Believe Two Fires Had Been Deliberately Set—First Suspicious Blaze Since the City Offered \$1,000 Reward for Arrest and Conviction of Fire Bug.

Searching investigation is being carried on into the circumstances surrounding the fire which early on Sunday morning did damage amounting to probably \$2,000 to the grocery store of Frank C. Jewett at the corner of Regent and King streets. Not only is Chief Roy W. Smith, who has initiated the investigation in the capacity of Deputy Fire Marshal, thoroughly convinced that the fire was of an incendiary character, but he has obtained what he believes is proof that it was an "outside job"—that is nobody connected with the establishment had anything to do with it.

This morning Chief Smith said that preliminary investigations had made it seem that two fires had been set, one in the cellar and the other on the ground floor near the main entrance. There are some odd coincidences in connection with Sunday morning's fire, amongst them being that it was exactly three months to the day and hour since the premises were profusely gutted by what was believed at the time to be an incendiary fire, the last blaze having taken place on the morning of May 29th last.

About noon on Sunday Fire Chief Smith called Mayor Phillips and Ald. Ivan McKnight, chairman of the Fire Committee, to the scene of the fire and they spent some time inspecting the building. The premises over the store were unoccupied at the time of the fire, Mr. Jewett and his family having been at Springer where they have been spending the summer. Some time ago the city offered a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the person responsible for starting the large number of incendiary fires that have occurred in Fredericton during the past two years or more, nothing resulted from the offer of the reward other than incendiary fires suddenly stopped and that early on Sunday morning is the first to have occurred since that time.
