ring in the papers yesterday saying that City Engineer Barrow would be able to supply a large number of men with work when the installing of the new water works system on the Beach was begun on Monday, nearly a hundred of the unemployed gathered in the City Hall corridors this morning. City Hall officials say that some of the foreigners smoke all chewing tobacco in their pipes, spit all over the floor, and make the air around the City Hall corridors so thick that it is almost impossible to cut it with a knife. As a result of this an agitation is on foot to have Relief Officer McMenemy shifted to the basement, although Mr. McMenemy declared he had nothing to do with the men being there. As a matter of fact, the contractors, Mercer & Lovejoy, employ the men, and not the engineer.

Another case of smallpox was reported to the Health Department to-day, the victim being a child named Campbell, whose parents reside at 110 Sanford avenue. Dr. Roberts says the child was not attending school. This case was also traced to the Goodale family. A stir was caused around the City Hall to-day, as a result of a report that two men suffering from smallpox had been waiting around the Relief Officer's door yesterday. The Medical Health Officer said there was no truth in this. He said that a man who had come in contact with Webb, the smallpox patient on Catharine street, but who was immediately vaccinated, was taken to his office by a doctor. There were three small pustules on the man's face, and he had what might be classed as modified smallpox. The man is under quarantine and the doctor says there is no danger from that quarter.

The special committee appointed to confer with east end mountain residents regarding the water supply for that portion of the mountain, will meet a deputation of the property owners to-night and discuss the proposition.

The city claims that J. Clendening, who has a connection with the Sherman avenue sewer, owes it \$20 rental, and ordered the connection cut off unless the money was paid. S. D. Biggar, acting for Mr. Clendening, paid the money under protest to-day.
