The bullet in some manner split apart, passing through the heart and part being lodged in the spine, causing im-mediate death. After all the witnesses hed ben heard, the jury, after some deliberation, rendered the following verdict: "That the said Philip Tet-rault came to his death by a bullet fired from a rifle in the hands of Thos. Robinson, but without intent to kill, and that the said Thomas Robinson be brought before the Magistrates of Granby for hearing."
