**POULTRY POINTERS.**

Keep a supply of ground bone and oyster  
shells where the fowls can always  
get them.

Do not feed too much at a time nor too  
often of the same article, nor too long in  
the same place.

Placed itself feed with other feed  
makes cows look sleek and glossy and it  
helps to clean the skin.

Millet and sorghum seed make a good  
feed for young poultry, and it used with  
cornmeal and little scraps will aid in  
keeping the chickens growing at small  
cost.

A very poor hen will not lay at all; an  
overfat one will lay but few eggs, and  
they will not hatch, while an overfat  
cock is sterile and not fit to use. Never  
use a deformed or weak fowl for breed-  
ing.

Milk in almost any form is good for  
poultry. It can be given to young chicks  
and growing fowls as well as to those  
that are matured. It should never be  
made to take the place of water.—St.  
Louis Republic.

**THE CHURCHMEN.**

The Rev. John Dow Hills, rector of  
Christ Episcopal church, Dayton, O., has  
been appointed university preacher at  
Cornell university for June 10 next.

Professor Mirgrouth of Oxford is one  
of the greatest scholars in England. He  
is a vigorous opponent of the higher criti-  
cism of the Bible, and although he is a  
low churchman, he is a great admirer of  
Archbishop Laud.

The Rev. Dr. Maunsell Van Rensselaer,
