### WEEKLY REVIEW OF TORONTO WHOLE-SALE MARKETS.

TUESDAY, November 4. The fact of Thursday, our usual day of publication, being a public heliday, has caused us to publish as much of our usual weekly review as is of interest to readers of the Weekiy Mail a day earlier

PRODUCE.

The market has been a good deal unsettled since our last, which unsettlement has been due partly to local and partly to outside causes. There has been a decided absence of orders in the market all week; and holders of grain and flour have, for the greater part of the period, been unwilling to accept ruling prices. Offerings have thus been reduced simultaneously with orders; and prices have been very much inclined to move up and down in sympathy with like movements outside. Continental advices by mail state that the wheat trade in France continued very strong with a decided advance. In the ports holders were very strong, and raised their pretensions considerably. At Marseilles in fact the wheat was so scarce, especially fine qualities, that as high as 61 to 62s per Imperial quarter was quoted for fine Berdianski and Marianople wheats for November and December delivery. At Havre 60s 3d per 490 lbs had been paid for red winter, free on rail, and 61s for prompt delivery. The quantity of American wheat on passage to France by sailers, according to latest postal dates, had increased to 783,000 qrs, against 590,000 qrs last week, and 457, 800 qrs as the corresponding time last year. Belgian markets participated in the general advance; at Answerp American red winter was quoted at equal to 55 to 56s 3d per 480 lbs, and spring at 52s 6d per 480 lbs; these prices show that the advance in Beigium has not kept pace with that in England and France, and the onsequence is that ers were helps made from the contract of th in Belgium has not kept pace with that in England and France, and the onsequence is that ers were being made from Antwerp at prices below those ruling in neighbouring countries. Rye likewise was very scarce in Belgium and in good demand. German markets also showed a considerable advance in prices, particularly in those for future delivery at Berlin. At Hamburg wheat was excited and gradually tending up, with an improved demand for export, principally for France. Saale barley was firm and decidedly improving. Stocks and supplies were falling off, and choice Chevalier was quoted at 51s up to 57s per 445 lbs f.o.b. Austro-Hungarian markets also were firmer, with home prices for flour above those for export. 
