### Long Service Medal For John Williamson

Wreckless Engineer, Presented With Recognition for Thirty Eight Years Faithful Service

In recognition of thirty-eight years of faithful service in the employ of the Canadian Government Railways, Mr. John Williamson, who retired from the service, on December 30th, 1916, was on Friday evening, presented with a long service medal, the gift of His Majesty the King.

Mr. Fred Carey, of Campbellton, Division Master Mechanic, acted as chairman and in presenting the medal paid a glowing tribute to the worth of Mr. Williamson as an employee of the Government. Mr. Carey said that the Imperial Service Order was instituted, in 1902 and included only persons in administrative Depts of the Government, and the membership was limited to 475, but this was revised in 1908 to include all persons in the employ of Government and the medal was a recognition of faithful and meritorious service. Mr. Williamson had served 38 years with the Canadian Government Railways and was therefore eligible for to wear the long service medal, which he had great pleasure in presenting and hoped that he would be spared many years to wear the same.

Mr. Williamson said that he had looked forward to the moment, when he would be eligible to wear his medal with a good deal of pride. It was now one of the proudest moments of his life to receive the decoration for faithful and meritorious service. It was an emblem he would wear with pride and distinction.

Congratulations were then extended Mr. Williamson in short speeches by Mr. T. V. Toner, and M. McCarren, representing the dispatchers, Mr. Carey, the Master Mechanic, W. Smallwood the Mechanical Dept; Andrew McCabe and John Witzell, the Engineers; Duncan Whiston, the car repairers; Harry McLean, of the Clerical staff, and John Allan, carpenters, and R. A. N. Jarvis on behalf of Mr. Williamson's friends in the town all of whom paid a warm tribute to Mr. Williamson, both as an employee and a citizen.

Mr. John Williamson entered the employ of the Intercolonial Railway September 29th 1879 as a fireman and made his last own as an Engineer December 30th 1916, being in the continuous service of the Railway thirty-seven years, three months and one day, during all which time he never had a week. A record that any man can point to with pride and the distinction of being awarded the coveted long service medal, is an honor that is well merited, and Mr. Williamson's many friends both in Newcastle and along the line of the C. G. R. join with The Advocate in extending congratulations.

### Beloved Lady Dies At Whitneyville

Mrs. Ernest Whitney Passes Away at Early Age of Twenty Seven Years

The funeral took place at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon and was largely attended. Services were conducted at the house and grave by Rev. S. Gray and interment took place in Whitneyville Baptist cemetery. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Emaley Mullin, Melvin Stewart, Fred Whitsey, Gregory, Benjamin and Edward Dunnett.
