FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE. HREW GUN SIGHTS OVERBOARD. A despatch from Berrehaven, Ireland,


A despatch from Berrehaven, Ireland, announces that the gun sights and other fittings of the British first-class battle-ship Magnificent, flagship of Rear Ad-miral Wm. Ackland, second in com-mand of the channel squadron, have been cast into the sea by members of the crew, in order to bring about the righting of grievances which the crew complain of Sydney Swept by Fire.


SYDNEY, Oct. 20.—The business centre of Sydney was swept by fire on Saturday atternoon and of two whole blocks only one building is left standing. It is esti-mated that property to the value of half a million dollars was destroyed, while sev-eral families are homeless and a number of business men ruined. Yesterday morn-ing Sydney was a happy town, with busi-ness hustling along Charlotte street. There was the roar and rush of traffic on the street. Today nothing remains but charred brick walls, tangled wires and smoking ruins. Streets filled with debris mark what is left of what once was the busiest centre of the town. The conflag-REPORTED FRENCH LOSSES. 


