More Threats of Resistance.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
Mr. Samuel Postmaster General, defending in the House of Commons the Home Rule Bill, granting financial aid to Ireland said, it was impossible to establish an Irish Parliament under circumstances which would compel an increase of taxation in Ireland by from 15 to 20 per cent. Under the Bill there was a prospect of the annual grant being reduced to a vanishing point, but the Unionist policy would increase the amount given by the United Kingdom to Ireland. The fact that Irish Nationalists in time past made violent speeches against the Government he contended was no proof that they would not be loyal under Home Rule. In Canada and Australia similar speeches in large numbers were made before these countries got self-government. The attitude of the Nationalist members in earlier years was the inevitable attitude of representatives of the people who were steadily denied the right of self-government, that position the Unionists sought to perpetuate. Mr. Horner, Unionist, declared the attitude of Ulster still was: "Ulster will fight and Ulster will be right." We are taking steps, he added, to perfect our machinery so that when the Bill passes, our provisional Government will begin to carry out its trust two years of passive resistance can be transferred into active resistance. The first shots fired in this conflict will not only rend the British Empire but the British army.

Found Dead.

The Minister of Justice had the following message to-day from Magistrate Cook, of Fogo:—The widow of James Morgan Wilcox was found dead in bed on Sunday. I am making inquiry.

He also had a message from Magistrate Lilly, of Trinity, stating that the body of William Hiseck, a victim of the drowning on Saturday, was found yesterday.

Another Inquiry.

OTTAWA, To-day.
The allegation that the captain and crew of the Government steamer, Minto, did not render proper assistance to the Earl Grey when ashore near Picton is the cause of another inquiry by the Wreck Commissioner. The Minto answered the Earl Grey's distress signals and took off mails and passengers, but did not attempt to pull off the vessel. The Department proposes to find out the reason.

Stead Donned a Lifebelt.

Washington, April 29. — Andrew Cunningham, a stateroom steward on the Titanic, said the order to call the passengers had been given at 12.30, fifty minutes after the ship struck. "I don't think there was any emergency alarm to call passengers," said he.
"How are passengers alarmed in case of disaster then?"
"Each stateroom steward calls his passengers."
By 12.30 a.m. all his passengers had gone on deck, said Cunningham, except Mr. Cummings, who was getting on an overcoat.
"After that William T. Stead asked me to show him how to put on a life belt. That was the last one I put on. I never saw him again."
After all the boats had gone, Cunningham said he and a mate had jumped clear of the ship, as he was afraid of the suction, and after swimming around was finally taken aboard a lifeboat. Those on the life boat were largely members of the crew, who had been picked out of the water.

A Titanic Claim.

An incident of the Recent Disaster.
Another incident in connection with the loss of the Titanic which will bring some degree of comfort to the afflicted widow, and bring home to many the wisdom of providing against the uncertain, is the fact that Mrs. Frank H. Mayberry, of Moose Jaw, Sask., whose husband lost his life on the Titanic, was totally unaware of her husband having taken out a ten thousand dollar policy prior to their going to England, and in her favor. It was only through the efforts of the company in locating Mrs. Mayberry that she was first made aware of the fact that ten thousand dollars was lying to her credit at the head office of the Railway Passengers' Assurance Company at 64 Cornhill, London, Eng. This is only one of the many losses now being paid by the company as a result of the above disaster.
The fact that the Railway Passengers' Assurance Company has paid out over thirty millions in claims, and that ample funds are provided for such catastrophes, fully illustrates the importance of insuring in a company granting adequate security to meet such contingencies. Inquiry Into Titanic Disaster.

LONDON, To-day.
Shipwreck experiences consumed the time of the Board of Trade Inquiry into the Titanic disaster. Only three witnesses were disposed of. No new light was shown beyond the facts elicited by American Senatorial Committee. The examination was significant, because it showed the Government's determination to discover what were steps taken to get off the third class passengers. The main points brought out in the general inquiry were that the ship was going at full speed; that no boat drills had been held; that some sailors did not know their stations; that boats were inadequately manned and directed and were not provided with lights, compasses, water and rations.

By that the idea is meant to be conveyed that Confederation is growing in grace and favour in Newfoundland. We beg to state that so far as we can gather that Newfoundland is no more in favour of Confederation to-day than in the past.

Injured by Illuminant.

On Wednesday night last a ball and demonstration took place on Bell Island and two of the participants, Messrs. Burke and Noonan, met with an accident as the result of an explosion. While illuminations were being made Mr. Burke was asked to light a quantity of magnesium and thinking it would act like stage powder he took his chance. The substance was held on a shovel by Mr. Noonan and when the match was thrown in by his companion the powder exploded. In consequence Mr. Burke had his right hand badly charred, also his face was scorched; while Mr. Noonan sustained serious burns to his left hand.

Practically the entire country between Vicksburg and Baird, Miss., is under water. The inhabitants estimate that this affair is likely to prevail for 6 weeks longer, according to reports brought back from Vicksburg to-day by the army relief steamer Wyanoke, which distributed 100,000 rations along the Sunflower River. Officers in charge of vessel report there are approximately 70,000 head of cattle to be taken care of along this river. Refugees numbering 200 were brought back to Vicksburg.
