Late Arrivals.

S. S. DURANGO.

The S. S. Durango, Capt. Chambers, arrived last evening from London which port she left thirteen days ago. It was the stormiest weather the Durango has had for some time. At intervals the wind veered to every point in the compass whilst snow storms were frequent. Continually there was a terrific sea running and the steamer could make but slow progress. She brought six packages of mail matter and 500 tons of cargo, including six boxes of explosives.

S. S. FLORENCE.

The Furness Liner Florence entered port last night after a stormy and eventful passage of sixteen days from Liverpool. Strong head winds were continuous, a regular series of winter hurricanes being encountered, and which accounted for the belated voyage. The ship brought 650 tons of general cargo and is anchored in the stream as the Durango is occupying the Furness White pier. The Florence will continue running on the St. John's, Halifax and Liverpool route.

The Solway Here

The S. S. Solway, Capt. Parsons, arrived here at 10 o'clock last night from the Labrador. The ship went as far as Cartwright arriving on the 28th ult. after a very stormy run. The ship had gales of wind from N. to N. W. with intense frost and snow on occasions, and the same prevailed until Battle Harbour was reached on the return south. Several feet of snow cover the ground on the coast and all the harbours are solidly frozen over. Heavy slob ice has also made on the outside and this prevented the ship from going further north than Cartwright.

Special Evening Telegram.
ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 3.
The 11-ton schooner Ethel B. Summer went ashore about midnight during a heavy storm near the breakwater side of Albert County. Capt. Patterson and three members of the crew were drowned.

ROCKLAND, Maine, Dec. 3.
Mrs. Elwell, of Cushing killed two small children and herself by jumping with them into an abandoned stone quarry, 400 feet deep and nearly filled with water. Family troubles are believed to have been the cause.

BERLIN, Dec. 3.
The Conference of the Ambassadors of the Great Powers, recently proposed by Premier Asquith, will be held in London. Prince Henry of Prussia's coming visit to London, according to the German Foreign Office, is without political significance.

TORONTO, Dec. 3.
The Board of Control this morning endorsed a proposal of Toronto suffragists that married women, owning property, should be allowed to vote on all municipal questions, and tomorrow will accompany the ladies to ask the Ontario Government for the necessary legislation.

GENEVA, Dec. 3.
Even Switzerland appears to be preparing for the eventuality of war. The federal government is filling various military store-houses with wheat and corn, ordered from Canada and the United States. A large quantity consisting of 572 carloads is now on the way to Zurich from Rotterdam, while the cargoes ordered by the Swiss Government are still afloat. Hostilities in the Balkans have had the effect of greatly reducing Russian shipments of grain.

SOFIA, Dec. 3.
The final meeting of the plenipotentiaries representing the allied Balkan nation and the Ottoman Empire, is to be held in the village of Baghchetsi on the Tchatatja lines at 4 p.m. to-day. The note calls for an armistice between the belligerents for the purpose of permitting them to enter into peace negotiations. It must be signed at that hour, or hostilities will at once be recommenced. Official circles here regard it as probable that the agreement will be signed.

EL DORADO, Kansas, Dec. 3.
When the first woman's jury on a Kansas Court record entered the jury room to begin its duties, the twelve members paused, a trifle uncertain as to the first move. "I believe we should pray," one juror said; so the twelve women bowed their heads in silent prayer. The jury gave a verdict which awarded the plaintiff \$12,000 damages based on a quarter section of land. A year ago the same case was tried before a jury of men, who were unable to agree on a verdict.

LONDON, Dec. 3.
The will of Lord Furness has been sworn at £5,000,000. This only comprises his personal estate and none of his land properties. The bequests include an annuity of £50,000 to his wife. The Grantley estate goes to his son. After authorizing payments to charitable institutions, Lord Furness has authorized the trustees to expend a sum not exceeding £15,000 towards an institution to provide facilities for training boys for the Mercantile Services.

BERLIN, Dec. 3.
Crown Prince Ferdinand of Roumania, accompanied by General Roques, arrived here this morning. The Prince was the guest of Emperor William at luncheon, and in the course of to-day and to-morrow will confer with the Imperial Secretary of States for Foreign Affairs and other German Statesmen. No announcement regarding the meaning of Ferdinand's visit has been made, but the press generally declares that it could not be wrong to consider it as a link in the recent chain of visits of courtesy, and as intended to indicate to the outside world the solidarity of members of the triple alliance, with Roumania.

True To Life in a Newspaper Office.

The "Amherst Daily News" says:

It is rather astonishing, however, how many people there are who entertain the idea that a newspaper can be run on sentiment and subscriptions. It can't be done and our friends who entertain such an idea should disabuse their minds of such a misconception.

A few of the actual every day experiences of life in this office may not prove uninteresting. A few weeks ago an old subscriber called at our office and asked us to publish a notice of a sale that he was having on his premises. We got out our rate card, estimated the size of the ad., and told him it would cost three dollars. Thereupon he lost his temper. He had been taking the paper for thirteen years and this was the first favor he ever asked of us. This was the way he talked to us. After his departure we looked up our subscription book and found that he was four years behind in his payments. Yet he left our office feeling disgruntled because we would not give him a yard or so of space free of charge.

Some church societies are our best patrons; others are the limit. They will take all the free advertising they can get, and will not even send us a pot of beans or a loaf of brown bread to help us out in our own commissary department. We were asked this week to advertise a certain church supper, our charge would be about fifty cents. The supper was of no earthly interest to us. We took the advertisement down over the phone, and time is money; informed the telephonist that it would cost fifty cents, and was then told that if we were going to charge for it that we need not put it in. We lost our time and we lost fifty cents, and we had something else to do at the same time.

Into our office walked a business man this very week. He gave us an ad., for which we charged a dollar, and then asked us to publish a local calling attention to this ad., which, if we published, should have been charged at ten cents a time, and there were twenty lines. Just imagine a man buying a pound of common soap from a grocer and asking him to throw in a pound of butter. We are asked to

Cyclone Kills 100 Persons
