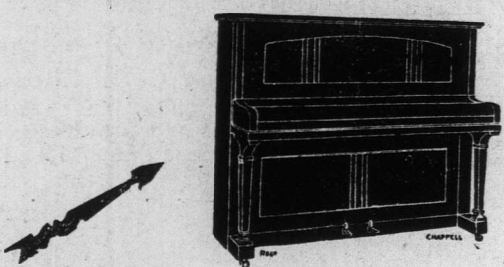

The Change on Gallipoli Peninsula.

The statement of the Secretary for the Colonies, Mr. Bonar Law, about the withdrawal of Sir Ian Hamilton from Gallipoli and the sending out of Sir Charles Munro is not a little puzzling. He states that Sir C. Munro has been appointed in succession of Sir Ian Hamilton, Commander of the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force. This would seem to imply that Sir C. Munro is to take command of all forces operating on expedition in the Mediterranean, viz., those on the Gallipoli Peninsula, those operating at Etna, and those operating from Salonika. It is manifest from the rushing of troops to these different points that the size and importance of the forces are increasing. The puzzle is why a commander of inferior rank to Sir Ian Hamilton has been chosen to a bigger command. According to the Army List issued last July, Sir Charles Munro is a Major-General, who was made a divisional commander on August 5th, 1914, and made a temporary Lieutenant-General on the 27th of December last. Sir Ian Hamilton is a full general, with seniority among the full generals only second to Sir Archibald Hunter. Moreover, it was stated last week, we do not know whether correctly or not, that Sir Bruce Hamilton was in command of the British forces landed at Salonika. Sir Bruce is also a full general and a step higher in rank than the rank which was temporarily given to Sir Charles Munro last December. In the absence of a definite statement on the matter, it seems to be probable that Sir Charles Munro's duties will be confined to the Gallipoli Peninsula, and that the forces under his command will not be so large as those which were under Sir Ian Hamilton. Otherwise a full general or a successful and experienced Lieutenant-General would have been sent there. Sir Charles was raised to the rank of Major-General in Oct. 31st, 1910, after a distinguished and successful career. It is clear that Sir Charles Munro has won the confidence of his superiors in the ability he has hitherto shown, or he could not have received the promotion which this command implies, which must have been given to him on Lord Kitchener's suggestion or endorsement, but it implies clearly a change in policy as regards the Gallipoli expedition, and as to the need

of a change and its nature we can rely with confidence that Lord Kitchener would not be a party to it, unless it was in the best interest of the nation in the future of the war.

Last night the Minister of Justice received a message from Justice of the Peace William Mitchell, of Sound Island, Placentia Bay, saying that Andrew Gilbert, aged 17 years, had been drowned there at 3:30 that afternoon, through the upsetting of his punt. The body had not been recovered.

The young man was at a small Hudson's Bay trading station when the war began. He travelled by canoe to Prince Albert, a journey of 600 miles, which he accomplished in fourteen days, and afterwards enlisted in a Canadian Highland regiment.

GERMAN WIFE OF BRITISH PASTOR, A SPY.

London, Oct. 12.—Mrs. Louise S. C. Herbert, the German wife of a British pastor at Darlington, has been sent to prison for six months, as a spy. Outwardly a staunch British subject, it was proved that she obtained from her servant girl information concerning a munition factory, and more-over made sketches of streets where troops were quartered. These activities, together with the fact that the addresses of a number of Germans were found in her belongings, brought about her conviction.

WHERE BURNS AND JEAN ARMOUR BEGAN HOUSEKEEPING.

A large company of lovers of Robert Burns, representing societies in all parts of the country, has gathered at Mauchline to witness the re-opening of the cottage in Castle Street, Mauchline, where in 1788 Burns and Jean Armour first took up house.
The cottage, which has been purchased and restored by the Glasgow and District Federation of Burns' Clubs, through the generosity of Mr. C. R. Cowie, of Glasgow, houses some interesting Burns relics. The rooms used by the poet and his wife have been restored as far as possible to their original form. The other rooms in the building will house old people in need of relief.
Several of the speakers pointed out that the home would be the first, among many memorials, to commemorate Jean Armour, whose devotion to her husband has long deserved a lasting tribute.
