Seal Arrives.

The S. S. Seal, Capt. Randell, which has been doing the northern service to Battle Harbor, returned to port yesterday about 5 p.m. The ship brought a large cargo of fish and oil, and hauled into the F. N. R. S. S. The Holy City Lives.

(From the Los Angeles Times.)
The British seem to be the sort of crusaders the Holy City needs. There is now a standard-gauge railroad from Cairo to Jerusalem with regular freight and passenger trains daily. Likewise, nearly ten thousand natives—men, women and children—are making more money than they ever did before, through working on their own roads and highways, which were found in pretty much the same condition as when they were cut by the wheels of Job's chariot. The people of Palestine were without their staples of rice and sugar for almost three years, but now have ample stores of wheat. They are now not only living, but learning how to live in a broader and more ambitious form than they were ever able to realize before. The hosts of General Allenby were the real deliverers of the temple.

Well Protected.

We have been asked to say that the doctors and nurses at all the hospitals where influenza patients are being received for treatment are well protected and every possible precaution is being taken to prevent the disease from communicating itself to all those who attend the cases.

VACCINE TREATMENT AND PREVENTION.

Enquiries are being made, is there not a vaccine with which to treat Epidemic influenza, and it has been noticed by the Toronto papers, that the University Laboratory has issued some vaccine to different parts of Ontario. Two weeks ago when vaccine was first spoken of, application was made from this Department to the Health Bureau of New York, for a supply as soon as possible. No answer has yet been received to this application, but it should come this week. As regards Toronto, the University there started the culture of organisms for the manufacture of vaccine, from a supply received from the Health Bureau of New York, so that the latter are the more likely to be first in the field. So far, the University of Toronto reports for 7,000 doses and this has been distributed to the towns in Ontario most severely stricken with the disease. However, acting on a suggestion from Mr. Morine, this Department has also made application to Toronto, and we will probably secure some at an early date.

Meanwhile the Health Department is issuing further instructions to the outposts, as to means of prevention, and, as we cannot know too much about it or be too careful in the precautions taken, it is advisable that all should read the instructions again very carefully and keep strictly to the advice given. The church authorities deserve the thanks of the community for falling in line so readily with the suggestions given; and, it is to be hoped that the men will also absent themselves from the club rooms, billiard rooms, bowling alleys and any other enclosed space where poor ventilation is liable to contaminate the atmosphere.



LONDON, Oct. 26.
