Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir—Allow me space in your valuable paper for a few remarks with regard to fish control.

I have been a reader of the Advocate for the past three years, and a strong supporter of Mr. Coaker, although I have never seen him; but judged by his press come day this Colony would benefit by his work. To my regret that of a great many more on this coast, and no doubt among his own men north, we see the gradual destruction of our Colony. A great many families will suffer this winter through Mr. Coaker's policy. If the West Coast people were being treated as Capt. Edwin Kean (one of Mr. Coaker's planters) stated in the Advocate that northern people were treated with regard to cull of course we couldn't go back on Mr. Coaker. According to a letter written by the above-mentioned captain to the Advocate he is perfectly satisfied with the cull of fish. I assure Captain Kean that if he were a fisherman on this coast where he could see and handle just as good a No. 1 fish as he will handle north, and had to contend with the cull as we have, he would not be so satisfied as he appears to be, and instead of 75 per cent. of his fish going as No. 1 he would have to be satisfied with less than 25 per cent.
