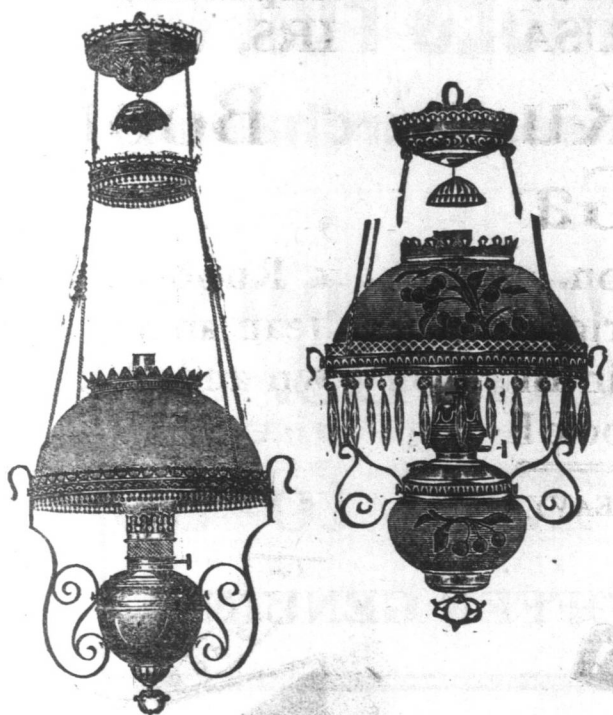

### Time for Prince to Marry

A cable to the Montreal Daily Star from London, contains the following statement regarding the marriage of the Prince of Wales from one who speaks with some authority on court matters:

"The public seems to assume from the Times' editorial that a struggle is in progress in exalted circles on the limitation of the Prince's choice of a consort, or else that the Prince has already chosen an English wife, and that the Times is breaking the fact to the people. There is no foundation for the second theory, the Prince having shown no inclination for any particular lady, except perhaps in one instance, which is now a few years old, and that lady is now married. It is no secret that a strong desire exists in one high quarter for his marriage with the Rumanian Princess. To another high quarter, his marriage with the daughter of a British duke of a family long and closely associated with the Court would be an ideal arrangement.

"There is a natural, popular desire that the Prince should marry an English girl. Another consideration is that every eligible princess of royal birth in Europe has some German blood in her, and that alone explains sufficiently the Times' taking a hand against any but an English consort for the Prince."

#### THE TIMES' EDITORIAL.

London, Oct. 16.—The Times leading editorial this morning, deals with the marriage of the Prince of Wales, suggesting the time has come for him to choose his wife, and hoping his choice will be his own and fall on an English girl.

Official circles declare there is immediate significance to this, but it is said the King and Queen also feel it is time for the Prince, who is 26, to marry and secure succession to the Throne.

So far the name of the Prince has been coupled with that of two English girls. The favorite of London gossip is Lady Joan Muhlolland, lady-in-waiting to the Prince's sister, Mary, sister of Lord Stratford, and a war widow.

Lady Joan is 31, the prettiest woman in Court, and the marriage would be popular in England. The second choice is one of the daughters of the Duke of Devonshire, Viceroy for Canada. Lady Dorothy, eldest of the unmarried daughters, is 20, and the Prince is said to have paid her attention during his Canadian trip.

An English marriage would be very popular with the English people, who are tired of foreign queens. There is nothing in the British law and no house law in the House of Windsor, like the German Royal houses, that royalty must marry royalty. Before the German Kings came to England, many English Kings married commoners.

There is no likelihood of an American or Canadian marriage, as sometimes is suggested.

### Where Curfew Still Rings.

The imposition upon Belfast of what is popularly known as the "curfew order" serves as a reminder that there are several places in England where the curfew bell is still rung regularly every night.

London boasts of two, at least, one of them being in Lincoln's Inn. The other is at the Charter-house, where all the year round the bell tolls the knell of departing day for the benefit of the "Poor Brothers" in residence.

Several of the curfew bells in England are kept ringing because of some old legend or custom. That at Chertsey, in Surrey, for instance, which had been rung regularly for centuries until stopped temporarily during the war, is the one made famous by the legend which relates how Blanche Heriot, to save the life of her lover, condemned to die at sundown, climbed the curfew tower and held the clapper of the great bell, declaring that "curfew shall not ring to-night."

The curfew bell at Kidderminster owes its continuance to the bequest of a traveller lost in a storm at night, whose life was saved by its welcome peals many years ago.

### Have You Allurophobia?

Are you an allurophobe? Dr. John Freeman has been writing in the British Medical Journal about people who are subject to the curious complaint which causes its victim to bolt from the room should a cat enter it.

The etymology of the term goes back to Herodotus, who first saw a cat in Egypt, and straight away named the animal alluros or "tail waver." The people of the Egyptian city of Bubastis, he says, were specially devoted to their cats, and he adds that "in whatever family a cat dies, every individual cuts off his eyebrows."

Folk lore has such to say for and against the cat. Throughout the middle ages cats and sorceresses always went together. Richelieu was devoted to his cat, but Napoleon dreaded the domestic pet. After the battle of the Wagram, while making his headquarters in the Austrian emperor's palace at Schonbrunn, the conqueror of Europe was heard a middle of the night calling excitedly for help.

His attendants rushed in, to find him trembling violently and lunging desperately with his sword at a cat hidden behind the bed curtains.

Lord Roberts was another victim of allurophobia. When Miss Merrick was painting his portrait, her cat had to be banished from the studio during the whole time the sittings lasted, nor would the hero of Kandahar travel on a ship as long as a cat remained aboard.

Persons who suffer from allurophobia detect the presence of a cat though they never see nor hear it. This was explained by the late Dr.

### Trees Growing in Church

In the right transept of the parish church of Ross, Herefordshire, Eng., are two sturdy young elms, which rise from the ground at the base of the wall. The story goes that they spring from the grave of the "Man of Ross," a local celebrity of the eighteenth century, who did much to beautify the town and neighborhood with trees and shrubs. The appearance of these

on his grave was regarded as so appropriate that they were allowed to grow. It is more likely, however, that they were shoots from an elm root outside, which found their way in by an interstice in the masonry. The trees flourished for many years in their unusual situation, until some building operations interfered with them. At present they are leafless, though one is said to be showing new signs of life.
