Reporters and Reporting

(By Editor Evening Telegram.)

Dear Sir:—I shall now, with your permission, go on to the reporter who reports court work and especially the lower courts. Recently there was a case before Judge Morris that of W. J. Whitty, Chairman of the Unemployed Workmen, against W. G. Goeling, the Mayor, representing the city. That was a test case and in one of four that is being brought against the Council on behalf of about twelve hundred men. Five or six thousand dollars are involved; although the claim in Whitty's case is only four dollars and eighty cents. That case directly involved at least six thousand men, women and children and has proved of great interest, not only to the workers and those depending on them, the citizens, whose money is at stake, but also to the country as a whole. If you take up that day's paper you will see more than half a column which gives a lot of matter some of which is incorrect, but nearly all of it is unessential, and the essential points of the case are omitted. It is not only untrue that I congratulated myself but even if I did it would not be of much interest. Everybody knows that I must do the absurd or wrong thing that it is the correct thing for reporters and others to ridicule and abuse me whenever they get the chance. The only person I congratulated was Mr. Carter, who ably pleaded the Council's case, and won it as I knew it would win it. I told the men so a week ago. I told Mr. Whitty so Thursday night. These cases had to be brought. They are only the preliminary steps in a movement that will settle questions of great moment. I purposely brought my weakest case first, for if we won on that the others would follow. If we win one of the four we will win all, because I am certain the Mayor would not be so unfair as to pay half the men at three-thirty and the other half at two-fifty, or if he does, his Mayor days will receive a sudden termination at least if those working men can do it.

It might be just as well for me to give you the facts, which I shall do briefly. The Premier, while Mr. Goeling was absent from the city, induced the Council to spend its own money in relief work. He, through guaranteeing a loan of \$100,000, enabled the Council to get the money from the Royal Bank. In addition to that the East and West End districts through their representatives contributed \$10,000 each for work outside the city, on condition that the Council spent a similar amount and spent it at the regular rate of pay, the regular employees of the Council, doing similar work, received, namely three dollars and thirty cents for a day of ten hours. The foreman were to receive two cents an hour more than the men. The men worked two or three weeks at three-thirty. On the 24th the foremen and timekeepers received a circular letter addressed "Sir," notifying them that commencing the 26th, the rate of wages would be \$2.50 per day. Some of the foremen told their men, some did not. The men as a whole, acting on my advice, objected, and notified the Council, that they worked under protest. I also notified the Council. They put in their time sheets at three-thirty. They were not accepted. They finally accepted two-fifty under protest. Whitty was paid for the six days commencing May 26th, four-eighths less than he would have been had he been paid at three-thirty rate. The others also were paid so much less. Whitty, representing the men, who worked in the city, where the Council was using its own money on its own work, sued on their behalf. Caleb Robbins, representing men outside the city where the men were paid with the joint money of the city and the East End district, also sued. Henry Duffin, sued on behalf of the men, under John Dempsey foreman, to whom the letter was not read and who were unaware of the notice to reduce. These are three of the cases. The fourth is by Caleb Robbins for work performed by certain of the men on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The points which determined Judge Morris's judgment are very simple, although a great deal of evidence was taken which helped to elucidate the facts of the case. "Had the Council the right to reduce the wages of the men working in the city with the Council's money?" The judgment was "it had." "Was the notice to the men notice to the foremen?" The judge decided it was, and on deciding those two points in favor of the Council dismissed the case. You will notice that the reporter has entirely missed the essential and given the unessential details of the case and in some cases drawn on his imagination which at times is vivid. To give you a further illustration of the same fact. He also in the same paper reports an assault case in which I appeared and for which the defendant was fined ten dollars. The assault was committed with a saw. The plaintiff swore that his ear was cut, and a witness swore that blood was running down the plaintiff's face and his hands were covered with blood. Knowing Judge Morris, as I do, knowing how anything in the nature of a butt or weapon is severely punished, while a flat encounter is hardly noticed, I told my client that all I could do was to try and reduce the fine, but that the judge would punish him and probably severely. A saw is not the most delicate thing to hit a man a couple of times over the head with. It was as I expected, and the man got off lightly for he was fined only ten dollars, but the reporter omitted to say anything about the saw, the blood, the cut, all he said was that the defendant was fined ten dollars, the least essential of all the facts of the case.
