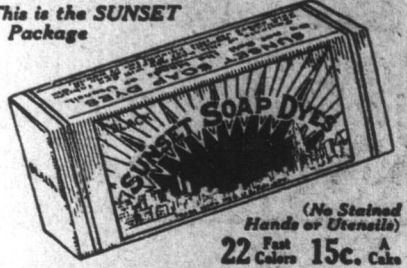

DUBLIN, April 15.

MANAGER LLOYD GEORGE.

GENOA, April 15.
Hub of the Economic Conference days by general consent is the de Albertis where Prime Minister Lloyd George is living and the Press has styled the British Premier "Manager of the Conference." Lloyd George is carrying out the idea of holding private discussions without minutes being taken and proceedings, without the usual communication to the Press and without the intervention of anyone of those directly concerned. His appeal, is "to prevent cry of the Franco-Russian peace." The idea seems to be working out well as the conference is individuals rather than as states.

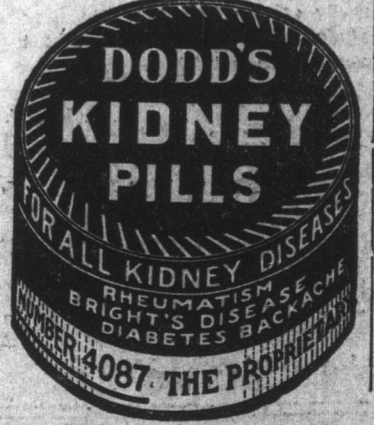
