Household Notes

On hearts of lettuce place thin slices of cheese. Arrange one-fourthinch slices of firm currant jelly around cheese, moisten with mayonnaise. Cut strips of light dough into dice and drop into hot lard. Stir until brown and drain. Sprinkle with little salt. These little cakes are nice

for a light lunch. If you wish to have a growing plant as a centerpiece, and do not wish your table service marred, cut a piece

of rubber sheeting the size of the centerpiece and place under it. Try spicing walnut meats. Boil 1 cup of sugar with 1/4 cup of water until syrup hardens when tried in cold

water. Stir in a little cinnamon ginger and 2 cups walnut meats. When taking a cutting from a plant form the habit of rubbing a bit of damp earth upon the end of the slip and also upon the spot where it was broken off. This prevents what is called bleeding-a loss of sap-and saves the vitality of both. It is putting salve upon an open sore.

It is a difficult matter to cut away the material under lace insertion with as the prosperous fishermen who live out severing a wrong thread unless means of overcoming the trouble be employed. Use a piece of cardboard four inches long, rounded at one end and cut wide enough to slip along between lace and the material. This will make the work easier and safer. until needed.

To remove ink spots from wash goods, melt a piece of tallow, plunge the ink spot into hot fat, then wash the piece at once and the ink will disappear, unless it is a colored garment which will not wash; then drop melted wax on the spot, let it become hard and remove with a sharp knife. The ink will be soaked up by the wax, and and press with a hot iron to draw it
