Obituary

MRS. FREDERICA ASH.

The Telegram learns with regret of the sudden passing at Trinity of Frederica Thorne Pack, the widow of Francis Ash, master mariner, whose death occurred about five years ago. The deceased was a daughter of the late Stephen Pack of the firm of Pack, Gosse and Friar, of Carbonear. and although she had reached the age of seventy-seven, she was enjoying the best of health and her relatives and her friends had no idea that death was so near.

A devoted church worker, Mrs. Ash will be greatly missed in St. Paul's Parish and her memory will long be cherished by her many friends in Trinity and elsewhere. Left to mourn are one daughter. Mrs. David Baird, two step-daughters, Miss Minnie Ash and Mrs. Foster who resided with her in Trinity and one son, Richard G. Ash, Secretary of the Newfoundland Board of Fire Underwriters, for all of whom deep sympathy will be felt in their bereavement.

The funeral takes place at Trinity on Sunday afternoon, and Mr. and Mrs. Baird and Mr. R. G. Ash left by express to-day in order to be present.

CHARLES FORAN

Word was received in the City yesterday of the almost sudden passing of Mr. Charles Foran, the day previously, at his home in Akron, Ohio, where he has been residing since his return from Overseas Service. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John W. Foran, his mother dying but a few months ago, and though he has been living abroad for a considerable number of years, he will be remembered by a host of friends in St John's to whom the news of his death will be received with feelings of deepest regret. A veteran of the Boer War, on the outbreak of hostilities in 1914 Mr. Foran enlisted with the Canadian Forces, with whom he gallantly served for over two years in France, when he was severely wounded and eventually invalided home. Un to Thursday last he was apparently in good health, when he was stricken with paralysis from which he never rallied. He was a man of fine ideals, whose ability, strength of character and charm of manner made him such a highly esteemed and popular figure and one whose death will be mourned by all who knew him. He leaves surviving two sisters, Mrs. Sholto Douglas of Bournemouth, England, and Miss Margaret Foran of this City, and one brother Mr. A. E. Foran of New York who was with him when he died; to all of whom we extend our sincere sympathy.


