New York 7.—The World still insists that during the past three weeks five vessels have left New York with expeditions for Cuba as follows: First vessel commanded by Colonel J. B. Johnson carried 552 men; second vessel, commanded by F. B. Spinola, 300 men; third vessel, 632 men; fourth vessel, commanded by Gen. French, 580 men; fifth vessel, commanded by Gen. T. J. Gordon, formerly chief of Gen. Beauregard's Staff, 420 men and 24 officers of all ranks.
