LONDON, Wednesday, July 29.

The past week has been a busy one in this market in some lines, particularly vegetables and fruit. The supply of both increased considerably and some days exceeded the demand. Prices at closing had declined in almost overy article. Tuesday, the last market of any importance in these special lines, saw a good many sales at low figures. Raspberries sold at 6c to 7c per quart and 75c to \$1 per pail; black currants at \$c to 16c per quart.

The grain market has been steady as to prices, but trade was dull on account of light deliveries. Oats ranged at about \$1 42 to \$1 44 for the week. There was nothing done in peas, barley or corn: none came forward.

To-day we had the first receipts of new wireat. Mr. Tuckey, of London township, was the seller, and Mr. Reynolds, Hunt Bros., the buyer. The wheat was of the Manchester variety, and was of very good quality, large berr standard bushel, and the wheat tested 63 lbs. Another load sold to Pritchard & Co, at \$1.50 per 100 lbs, or equal to 90e per bushel. We quote wheat to-day at 90e for new and \$1 for old per bushel, or \$15 to \$1 for Per 100 lbs, the inside figures being the price of new and the outside for old. General quotations are as follows:

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Tardy Justice Done to Northwest Rebellion Claimants.

Arnoldi "Ceases from the Active Performance of His Duties."

OTTAWA, July 29.—When the House resumed this afternoon the Election Franchise Act amendment introduced by Sir John Thompson was again taken up. The time for voters to apply to have their names put on the lists is extended from July 29 to Aug. 15 in the bill, which passed its third reading. Revising barristers are to be notified at once by telegraph. The supplementary lists are to be made up from the assessment rolls of the current year. When the revising officer gives public notice of his final transcript he shall keep the list open for public inspection not less than six days. for public inspection not less than six days.
