Forty Lives Lost by the Bursting of a Dam in Arizona.

Dam in Arizona.

PRESCOTT, A. T., Feb. 23.—The fine large storage dam built across Hassavampa River by the Walnut Grove Water Storage Company two years ago at a cost of \$300,000 gave way yesterday morning under great pressure of heavy floods, and swept everything before it. Forty persons are known to have lost their lives. As the town of Wickenburg, 30 miles below the dam, is on the same stream, great fears are entertained for the safety of that town. The service dam of the company, located fifteen miles below the reservoirs, had fifteen miles of flume just approaching completion, was also swept away. The company had spent over \$800,000 on the enterprise of storing the water. The dam which held the waters back was 110 feet long at the base and 400 feet at the top. It was 110 feet thick at the base and ten feet at the top, forming a lake three miles in length by three-fourths of a mile wide, and 110 feet deep.

A PERFENDICULAR WALL OF WATER FULLY FIFTY FEET HIGH came rushing down the narrow valley with almost incredible speed. Fortunately there were but comparatively few people living near the bottom of the hillsides, and of these a large number were warned by the awful sound and escaped to higher ground. The valley widers above Wickenbury, and much of the town lies upon the lowlands close to the course of the stream, and it is almost certain that the vast body of water which rushed out of the reservoir has carried away many houses in that place, and serious loss of life has doubtless occurred here.

here.

Heavy rains had fallen for several days, and early Saturday morning the water rose to the top of the dam and cut a small passage near the center, which rapidly widened and deepened as the water poured over it, until in less than twenty minutes the little stream had become a roaring cataract.

cataract. The Loss.

There can be no correct estimate of the loss of life yet, or of property, but the latter will reach into millions, while the loss of life, without doubt, will be great, as many families were living near the stream in the narrow canyons.



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
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
