to work like a charm. On the first instal-
ment \$170,000 was paid, only \$253 less than

Church at a salary of \$500.—All members of No. 1 company,
Seventh Fusiliers, who expect to take part

night in eight Pullman cars. They partook
of supper in the station dining hall to the

Court of Appeal was held at the
court house yesterday, and the case of
John Dalziel, Sarnia, vs. the Township of
