#### DIED IN JAIL.

Sad End of Mrs. Elizabeth House.

Eighty-three Years Old and Insane-Was Awaiting Removal to the Asylum-Result of the Inquest.

Eighty-three years of age, insane, with but few friends in the world, and waiting removal to the asylum was the pitiful position of Mrs. Elizabeth House, when she died in the county jail at 1:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. House was for many years a resident of Adelaide street, just north of the city limits. Her husband died several years ago, and left her a snug ittle house and a sum of money—enough to keep her for the remainder of her days. It is afleged by some that Mrs. House lent a portion of the money, and inability to collect it is supposed to have unbalanced her mind, and on Nov. 17 it was necessary to place her in custody. On that date the old lady was remanded by Squire Smyth, and a week later was committed as insane. On Nov. 27 Mrs. House was, on the testimony of the jail physician, Dr. Macarthur, adjudged insane, and her removal to the
