The absence of lively interest is indicated by the size of the vote. For the mayoralty contest in 1898 there vere 6,795 votes cast; last year, 5,195 and this year only 5.057. There are reasons for this, but chief among them was the scarcity of first-class material in the aldermanic field. There is a considerable shake-up in the personnel of the council, only eight of last year's aldermen being re-elected, and among those eight are two or three who should have been rejected for reasons wehih are obvious to all who have followed municipal affairs.

In No. 1, Ald. Pritchard heads the poll and Ald. Brener is a good sec-The latter has already served on the council and proved a good

In No. 2, Ald, Jenkins' immense majority is largely due to personal sympathy, a great many believing he had been harshly dealt with as a member of the police force. Ald. Douglass, a typical ward alderman, is re-elected, as is also Ald. Jolly. Mr. Donohue

was a good fourth. In No. 3, Dr. Hugh Stevenson heads the poll. This is an encouragement young men of good standing and ability to come out and offer their services. Ald. Winnett is re-elected, and Ald. Ross has the distinction of being the only Socialist candidate elected. He is a good business man, and there is every reason to believe he

make a good alderman. In No. 4 ward, Ald. Cooper, after a year's eclipse, again heads the poll, chiefly on account of his strong attitude against the street railway com-pany. Ald. Malloch is a good second, and Ald. Garratt barely squeezes in over the labor candidate, Alex. Mc-

In No. 5, Ald. Plant, the labor candidate heads the poll by nearly 200 over Ald. Dreaney, who has for years held the first place. This is a very handsome tribute to Ald. Plant, whose course has been firm, yet moderate. Ald. Bartlett, in the fifth ward, is no stranger to the council.

In No. 6 ward, the successful trio are Ald. Wray, Ald. Gerry and Ald. Barned. Of last year's representatives, Ald. Parnell and Ald. McCallum vol-untarily retired, after much good service, and Ald. Greenlees was defeated

at the polls.
Of the aldermen-elect, Ald. Jenkins,
Stevenson, Ross, Plant, Dreaney and
Wray were indorsed by the Trades and Labor Council. Mr. Donohue in No. 2 ward and Mr. McRae in No. 4 were regular labor nominees, and both were almost elected.
The election of Ald. Rumball as

mayor was expected, but it is admitted on all hands that Mr. Darch polled a surprisingly big vote, showing that he drew a large body of support from organized labor, although many workingmen were not prepared to class themselves as Socialists.

All the members of the school board whe offered for re-election were suc-Mesers. Little and Jones, were relected without a contest, and Col. Lewis also returns by acclamation to

the hospital board, where he has served so long and so faithfully.

The electors did a good stroke of work by voting for the abolition of the ward system, the majority for the bylaw being a sweeping one.
