A member of the expeditionary corps states that the crimes of which these soldiers have been convicted were chiefly those mentioned in the so-called "Hun" letters, out of which the Social Democratic press made so much capital. It is recalled that the government press denied the truth of those letters in a half-hearted nanner, convincing the reading pub-

ic that the alleged atrocities had really been committed. Among the imprisoned soldiers are many officers, some of whom are in duress owing to their alleged cow-
