SEVENTH TIME!

Chicago Man Tried to End His Life and Succeeded at Last.

Chicago, Sept. 3.-After attempting six times to commit suicide during the last two years, Frederick Schultz, of 1,539 West Forty-ninth Place, killed himself, although after he had drank a quantity of carbolic acid he wanted to live. He died, however, before medical aid could reach him.

Schultz boarded with his stepmother, Mrs. Emma Briel, and was employed as an extra man in the butchering department at the Armour plant at the stock yards. He returned home from work on Saturday and talked for a while with Mrs. Briel, then went out. Half an hour afterwards he returned to the house and walked into the parlor, his lips twitching and his face ghastly white.

"I have fixed myself this time," said Schultz to Mrs. Briel. I wish I had not taken the stuff. Isn't there something I can do to save myself?"

Mrs. Briel placed the man on a lounge and sent for physicians, but by the time they had arrived he was beyond aid and died shortly after seven o'clock.

Since her stepson's repeated attempts at suicide, Mrs. Briel has been careful about keeping any poisonous drugs or acids about the house, but a short time ago she purchased a bottle of carbolic acid unknown to him. The bottle of acid was left in a basket in the hallway, and it is believed that when Schultz saw it there on Saturday he determined to end his life.

LABOR'S LEGIONS

Unite to Demonstrate the Growing Strength of Trades Unionism.

St. Thomas, Stratford and London Unions Celebrate Labor Day at the Railway City.

Magnificent Parade of 2,000 Organized Workmen-Programme of Sports and Games at Pinafore Park-Stirring Speeches By Prominent Labor Leaders.

Labor's holiday has never been celebrated so royally in the western district of Ontario as it was yesterday in the busy Railway City. The trades unions of St. Thomas, London and Stratford combined to mark the day, and their success was a demonstration of the strength of organized labor in the cities represented. The tollers are evidently being educated to the advantages of combination and organization, and each year witnesses a large increase in their ranks in the cities where unionism has attained a foothold. Yesterday's celebration at St. Thomas was certainly a magnificent demonstration of the growing strength of organized labor in Western Ontario.

The St. Thomas Trades and Labor Council, with the assistance of the local unions, planned and carried out a demonstration to eclipse which will require strenuous efforts on the part of labor in the sister cities. The success is all the more creditable because of the fact that this was the first celebration of Labor Day ever held in St. Thomas. The labor men were heartily seconded in their efforts by the merchants and manufacturers of the Railway City, who vied with each other in supplying floats and decorations, and thus making elaborate displays of their wares or handicraft.

London's trade unionists were out in force for the occasion. For weeks the local unions had been arranging for the outing, and when the day dawned the organized workmen were early astir. They formed in procession in and around Victoria Park, and marched to the G. T. R. station, where they boarded L. E. and D. R. trains. Over 2,000 tickets were sold to London excursionists. They reached St. Thomas shortly before 11 and found their fellow unionists awaiting their arrival. The Stratford delegation, numbering over 400, had reached St. Thomas about 10, going by G. T. R. special train via Tilsonburg.

The monster procession formed in four sections, the union men on Inker man street, the commercial section on Balachlava street, agricultural on Alma street, and the remainder on the main street. street, and citizens on Manitoba street. The parade was over two miles in length, taking 50 minutes to pass a given point. There were four bands in it-the 25th, of St. Thomas; the 28th, of Stratford; Mr. Roselle Pococke's band, of London; 33 strong; and the Dexter Band, of St. Thomas. The workers in line were estimated at from 2,000 to 2,500, and the members of many unions went to the parade, adding greatly to the picturesque of the scene.

The place of honor was accorded to the London unions. They immediately followed the carriages containing Messrs. Sargent and Dodge; George Wrigley, of Toronto; James Baker, president of the London Trades and Labor Council; W. Lovel, president of the Stratford Trades and Labor Council; William Bear, chairman of the St. Thomas committee; R. M. Anderson, president of the St. Thomas Retail Merchants' Association; and F. R. Mitchell, president of the St. Thomas Trades and Labor Council. Other delegates and members of the Ladies' Auxiliary, No. 37, of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, London's contingent was accompanied by Mr. Roselle Pococke's band, a new organization, and it was marshaled by Mr. Wm. Burleigh, with Messrs. Norman Lockhart and John Roberts as deputies. The Cairncross band, by far the strongest turnout, being 100 strong, and wearing caps of white, with a blue band and white braid knotted over a black peak. The Broommakers' Union, No. 203; the Building Laborers' Union, No. 8, followed in the order named. Typographical Union, No. 133, made a good showing, 90 strong, the printers wearing black and white peak caps. The Coal Employes and Tobacco Workers, No. 61, were well represented. The Stove Mounters, No. 33, wore natty-looking shirt waists, and were the only organization thus attired. The Tailors' Union, No. 183, and the Machinists' Union, No. 18, and the Machinists' Apprentices, were the strongest organization from the Classic City, and the other unions in line were the Cigarmakers, the Woodworkers and the Carpenters and Joiners.

The turnout of St. Thomas unionists was fully equal to that of London. The locomotive firemen and engineers made a decided hit with their engine, drawn on a truck by four horses. The importance of the railways to St. Thomas might have been judged by the number of railroad employes in the parade. Besides 75 engineers and firemen, there were a large number of conductors and trainmen. The engine crews wore white caps and blue overalls, and the trainmen wore blue caps and the machinists wore blue caps and overalls. The Federal Union, No. 100 in number, wore blue caps.
