Search for One.

HUDSONS BAY TO BE EXPLORED

The Dominion Government to Enforce
Obedience to Customs Laws by
Yankee Whalers.

St. John's, Nfld., July 17.—The Canadian Government has chartered the Newfoundland steamer "Neptune" to convey a scientific expedition to Hudson's Bay. The expedition will winter at Chesterfield Inlet. Its object is to determine the availability of the region for Canadian grain route. Captain Samuel Bartlett, for several years navigator of the Peary steamers, is in command of the ship, the crew of which consists of Newfoundlanders familiar with ice work. The scientific party is composed of Canadians. The ship will also enforce the Canadian customs laws against American whalers who are operating in Hudson's Bay. This is the second seal ship chartered within a month, the British admiralty recently securing the Terra Nova to convey a relief expedition to the Antarctic steamer Discovery.

UNABLE TO RESTHis Holiness Also Breathes
With Difficulty.

WASTED ALMOST TO A SKELETON

Dr. Laponi's Son Expelled From
the Vatican by Order of Cardi-
nal Oreglia.

Rome, July 17.—The Pope's condition this morning is even less satisfactory than yesterday morning, and he suffered from much uneasiness and difficulty in breathing until relieved to some extent by an injection of caffeine. The new crisis in the Pope's condition presented itself yesterday when the doctors were confronted on the one hand with the apparently imperative necessity of another operation and on the other hand with the danger that such an operation might prove fatal.

This dilemma was canvassed by Dr. Laponi and Dr. Mazzoni through-
out the day. At their earlier confer-
ence there was some prospect that the
operation might not occur and the doc-
tors left the sick room without arriv-
ing at a definite determination as to
when it would take place. They ex-
pressed the belief, however, that a
delay until today would serve a use-
ful purpose in permitting a larger ex-
traction of serum in case the opera-
tion was undertaken. Meantime the
Pope continued in a state of great
depression.

Thanks to a fairly good afternoon's
sleep, the physicians were able to is-
sue a bulletin at 7:25 p.m., showing
that there had been no vital change
in the normal progress of the disease,
though the same serious rapidity of
respiration as was noticed in the
morning had again to be recorded. So
painful had the latter become that one
of those present in the sick room
described the Pontiff as literally paint-
ing for his life's breath.

Later the Pope was sufficiently at
ease to receive Cardinal Rampolla,
and his holiness conferred upon him
the enlarged authority made necessary
by the present illness for the execu-
tion of the administration of the Vatican.
It is understood that one result of this
action will probably be the speedy ap-
pointment of a successor to the Pope.

The Pope leaves nothing
unattended to show the world up
to the last moment how much he trusts
Rampolla, who, after serving Leo for
sixteen years, is now made the sub-
ject of bitter attacks. The Pope was
much pleased when Cardinal Rampolla
informed him of the universal mani-
festations of sympathy towards his
holiness coming from all, even from
non-Catholics.

7:25 p.m.—The following bulletin has
just been issued: "His holiness' con-

10 p.m.—The doctors, after a care-
ful examination of the patient, have
decided to postpone another opera-
tion, as the pleuritic liquid is appar-
ently stationary. His general condi-
tion is unchanged.

2:55 a.m.—Dr. Laponi has again
had recourse with beneficial effects to
an injection of caffeine, which has
not been used for some days, be-
cause of the Pope's dislike to it.

12:20 p.m.—The Pope complained
of suffering from soreness owing to ly-
ing down so long, and succeeded in sit-
ting up. He then rose momentarily
from the bed and seated himself in
his armchair.

The doctors attending Pope Leo, al-
though not entirely satisfied with the
general condition today somewhat bet-
ter, whereas they expected him to be
much worse. The Pope's pulse is
exactly as it was yesterday, and his
temperature is about the same, while
his respiration shows a little improve-
ment, having returned to what it was
on Wednesday. His appearance, how-
ever, is that of one who could not last
another hour.

Dr. Laponi, wishing to leave the
Vatican on urgent personal business,
asked permission of the Pontiff, who
not only said "Yes," but readily
added: "I am so glad to have you go,
but great remorse, as you are all
perfect martyrs by your behavior."

Dr. Laponi remained away from the
sick room a half hour.
Dr. Mazzoni entered the Pontiff's
bedroom at half-past eight o'clock this
morning, after Dr. Laponi had re-
ported to him how his holiness had
passed the night. He found the pa-
tient, as Pope Leo himself had said
"unrefreshed and tired." His holiness
complained that while the doctors had
promised that his illness would not
last long, it is now three weeks since
he went to bed.

The Pontiff prefers to sit up in bed
as in that position he feels less op-
pression on his lungs and can breathe
more easily.
Dr. Mazzoni spent much time in ex-
amining him. As his holiness is re-
duced almost to a skeleton, if a new
operation is decided upon it will not
be because of any hope of saving the
patient's life, but simply for the pur-
pose of rendering the death agony less
acute.

After the doctor's visit his holiness
appeared calmer and rested better. He
also took some light nourishment.
Paris, July 17.—The Dix-Neuvieme
Siecles correspondent at Rome says
that Dr. Laponi's son, who reports
favorable to Cardinal Rampolla,
has been expelled from the Vatican
by orders of Cardinal Oreglia. An-
other dispatch from Rome says
preparations for the Pope's death are
continuing at the Vatican. The sisters
of the Order of St. Vincent de Paul
are sewing mourning hangings in the
court of Charlemagne. Cardinal Oreglia
has decided that no unauthorized
person shall set foot in the Vatican
during the convalescence. Accordingly he
has had a special medal struck bear-
ing on one side the word "Interreg-
num" and on the other "July 9, 1903,"
without which no one will be allowed
to enter the Vatican.

2:10 p.m.—At this hour no change
has been reported in the condition of
Pope. Calm prevails throughout
the Vatican.

During last night as well as through-
out this morning the Pope continued
restless and in pain. He has been
sitting up for some time. He does not
want anyone constantly in the room,
the Pontiff rings a bell for his desires,
showing beyond doubt his desire for
"companionhip." He takes very fre-
quently sips of meat broth, alternated
with half spoonfuls of chicken gelat-
ine.

When asleep the Pontiff appears to
be at ease. His cheeks are sunken, his
eyes are hollow, and his jaws are ex-
ceptionally prominent. The skin being
lightly drawn over the bones. When
awake the Pope usually appears to
suffer only in his brilliant black
eyes, though he regained lucidity of

LONDON DOUBTS
CZAR'S SINCERITYStill Thinks Evacuation of
New Chwang Impossible

DESPITE ASSURANCES TO U. S.

Belief Is That Russian Diplomacy
Will Raise Obstacle to With-
drawal of Troops.

London, July 17.—According to the
Times correspondent at Shanghai it is
the opinion of Chinese officials that the
Port Arthur conference has not made
the evacuation of New Chwang any
more probable. A correspondent at
New Chwang reports that on July 4
the Russian flag was hoisted again at
the railway station of Kingtszekau,
the terminus of the Shanhaiwan line.
The few morning papers which com-
ment on the announcement that the
state department at Washington has
received assurances from the Chinese
Government that it will shortly open
several ports to the world's trade, con-
gratulate Secretary Hay on the suc-
cess of his mission. The Russian flag
has been hoisted in the admission of
the principle of the "open door" in
China, and the Chinese Government has
been expressing great suspicion that
Russia's diplomatic policy has left
some troublesome conditions in reserve,
they are inclined to believe that Sec-
retary Hay is too astute to be put off
with a mere paper concession.

St. Petersburg, July 17.—A telegram
received here from Port Arthur says
that upon the occasion of the laying of
the cornerstone of the cathedral there
General Kuropatkin, the Russian War
Minister, made a speech, in which he
expressed the conviction that "Port
Arthur is now becoming a fortress in-
accessible to all enemies, no matter
how great their number or whence they
came."

xiety to become converts to the new
faith. But Der Doo, the well-to-do mer-
chant importer of 116 Park avenue, de-

The general founder is a clever and
wealthy native of the Flowery King-
dom named Loong Kie Chou, who is
now touring the country in search of
converts, and who has only recently
left Baltimore. While here he was en-

The religion is not opposed to Chris-
tianity in any sense, and is really made
up of its principal tenets, literally in-
terpreted, and of certain laws more
civil than churchly in their bearings.
Indeed, in this latter feature of the be-
lief it is not unlike Judaism, because
of the close association of religion with
daily customs. A number of laws have
been framed which are expected to
waken the followers in China to a
sense of their narrowness and incu-
late that spirit of progress and human-
ity that is making Japan such a suc-
cessful nation. While the disciples, of
whom Der Doo is a most ardent one,
also lay equal stress on the laws, Der
Doo was asked if he would not try to
have the Chinese here go to meet the
of the association rather than to Sun-
day school, and he admitted that such
was the idea, but hastened to add that
they would not only come in contact
with the same religion, but learn nec-
essary things about how to make their
country a more comfortable place to
live in.

Said he: "Christ said to give all that
you had for him and to teach his reli-
gion, and that is what two men, Loong
Kie Chou, in this country, and one in
China, did. Loong Kie Chou is spend-
ing \$50,000 of his own money and he
does not ask anything from any-
body. That is what made me hear him
when he was here last Sunday. I sent
out invitations to my friends here in
the city, 600 invitations, to hear him,
and only about 20 came."
